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1 Overview

This chapter introduces the product features, main scope of application and specifications. Also, it describes how to properly operate the instrument and electrical safety precautions.

1.1 General

The S1465 series signal generator has a frequency range of 100kHz - 67GHz, excellent spectrum purity and output power, with SSB phase noise of 10GHz carrier @ 10kHz frequency offset of - 126dBc/Hz, max. output power up to 1W@20GHz, power dynamic range greater than 150dB which can meet high demands for test signals; it also features high-precision analog sweep function, excellent simulation modulation, pulse modulation and vector modulation; the baseband signal generator is easily set up and flexible, and supports multiple modulation formats, allowing users to edit and download the required waveform for signal simulation based on individual needs; the internal and external vectors have wide modulation bandwidth (internal 200MHz and external 2GHz) which can meet the needs of broadband signal simulation; the internal modulation signal generator has frequency up to 10MHz and multiple signal waveforms, pulse modulation supports minimum PW of 20ns and generates flexible pulse trains that can satisfy the needs for testing various complex signals; the product has a 10.1" large display with resolution of 1280×800 and can be operated by keys, a mouse or screen touch, improving the operating experience while enhancing the testing efficiency. The S1465 series generates high-quality signals in both continuous wave and modulation, making it an ideal local oscillator and clock source, and a high-performance simulation signal source. It is mainly used for comprehensive assessment of radar performance, high-performance receiver testing and component parameter testing, applicable for many fields such as aerospace, radar, communication, navigation equipment, etc.

1.1.1 Product features

1.1.1.1 Basic function

The S1465 series signal generator developed by Saluki embraces the following main features:

1) Three basic modes of signal output: Continuous wave (CW) signal, sweep signal and digital modulation signal.

> Continuous wave (CW) signal

In this mode, the instrument generates a CW sine signal with the frequency and power level defined by the user.

Sweep signal

Basic sweep outputs are provided, including step sweep, list sweep and ramp sweep. Multiple sweep triggering inputs and outputs are provided.

> High-precision broadband vector modulation signal output

If an internal baseband is used in the S1465-V signal generator, vector modulation signals of bandwidth up to 200MHz can be generated; when an external I/Q is used, the modulation bandwidth is 200MHz, supporting broadband I/Q input of external arbitrary waveform generator, with RF modulation bandwidth up to 2GHz.

- 2) Generation of internal broadband and multi-system baseband signals. The vector signal generator can produce digital modulation (real-time) baseband signals, with single-channel bandwidth up to 100MHz.
- 3) External reference clock (ERCLK) input of baseband, and synchronous input of external data source.
- 4) Storage and calling of instrument set state, and one-button self test.



1.1.1.2 High performance


1) Excellent spectrum purity

The S1465 series signal generator can generate high-purity signal spectrum, of SSB phase noise 10GHz carrier@10kHz frequency offset (typical value) -126dBc/Hz, 1GHz carrier@10kHz frequency offset (typical value) -142dBc/Hz, making it applicable for testing of Doppler radar, high-performance receiver blocking and adjacent channel selectivity, and an ideal alternative of local oscillator and low-jitter clock.



2) Broadband high power output

Typical value of max. output power of H05 high power option: +22dBm @ 20GHz, +20dBm @ 40GHz (-V series: +16dBm), +10dBm @ 67GHz (-V series: +6dBm). H06 enhanced high power option has output power up to 30dBm (1W). During testing, high power excitation signals, if required, can be obtained without connecting to an external amplifier, and the power has higher accuracy and stability.




Fig. 1.3 Max. Output Power of S1465F+H05




Fig. 1.4 Max. Output Power of S1465F-V+H05

3) High-vector modulation bandwidth

The S1465-V series can generate vector signals of modulation bandwidth 200MHz and 2GHz external (> 3.2GHz carrier).




Fig. 1.5 5GHz Carrier 200MHz Modulation Bandwidth Multi-tone Signal






Fig. 1.6 60GHz Carrier 200MHz Modulation Bandwidth Multi-tone Signal

4) Download of high-compatibility arbitrary waveform data format

The S1465-V series supports downloading and playing of arbitrary waveform data in storage formats of Mat-File 5, ASCII, Binary, cap, csv and up to the depth of 2G sampling point.




Fig. 1.7 Downloading and Playing of Arbitrary Waveform Data

5) Vector modulation accuracy

The S1465-V series has high vector modulation accuracy of EVM<1.4% (test value<1.0% for 100kHz - 40GHz) and EVM<2.5% (test value<1.5% for 40GHz - 67GHz).




Fig. 1.8 Vector Modulation Accuracy

6) Universal digital modulation in complete formats

The S1465-V series supports real-time generation of universal digital modulation signals in more than 20 formats including PSK, QAM, FSK, MSK, etc.






Fig. 1.10 512QAM

7) Complete series of frequency band

Based on specific demands of different users, the S1465 series signal generator can provide various test plans for upper frequency limits of 3GHz/6GHz/10GHz/20GHz/40GHz/50GHz/67GHz, and there are signal generators of common type and with vector modulation function (-V series) for each frequency band, i.e. totally 14 types of this series. Each type has many options for function and performance extensions. From measuring-level solutions to basic types, whether you only need test signals of RF band or of MMW frequency, we guarantee a suitable one for you.

1.1.1.3 Flexibility

1) Large-screen TFT LED gives graphical display and supports operation by screen touch and front-panel keys.

The S1465 series signal generator is applied with self-designed software, a large screen and a Chinese/English operation interface to provide a panoramic view of current status information. The interface is of a window-type operation structure, allowing easy operation by keys and screen touch for efficient, flexible and convenient use.

2) It supports flexible function configurations such as sweep, real-time baseband, etc.

The S1465 series signal generator supports flexible configurations such as sweep, real-time baseband, and trigger source. The setting of trigger source determines the source of the event triggered, and the setting of trigger mode determines the trigger action after event generation. Through the combination of both, users can generate trigger signals according to actual needs of the test.

There are multiple remote interfaces available for the S1465 series signal generator, including source module port, GPIB port, network port, for easy remote control and network upgrading.






Fig. 1.13 Remote interfaces

1.1.2 Typical Applications

1) Building a solid basis for high-reliability satellite communication equipment testing

The S1465-V series can generate high-quality user-defined and basic digital modulation signals within the frequency range of 100kHz ~ 67GHz, and provide repeatable and reliable tests for satellite communication system. The high-bandwidth external vector modulation, self-defined data source and additive noise functions enable users to produce true test signals for product tests.

2) Providing radar equipment and electronic countermeasures system with test signals for different application scenarios.

The S1465-V series has wide frequency range, high resolution (16bit) and excellent signal simulation. In combination with synchronous trigger port with rich functions, it produces complex sequences in various modulation formats by editing waveform segments for different scenarios, in order to simulate complex interference signals in real combat environment to test the radar ECCM performance.

3) Providing accurate arbitrary waveform modulation signals for invisible aircraft systems, high-capacity communication equipment systems and electronic warfare systems (EWS) to meet the current and future market demands.

The S1465-V series has waveform storage up to 2G sampling point to allow designers to obtain long-time test scheme closer to reality. It supports five arbitrary waveform data formats that meet the design requirements of main tool software.

4) High-performance receiver test

With ultra-low SSB phase noise and excellent anharmonic suppression, the S1465 series signal generator can produce ideal pure signals for testing the phase noise, blocking, adjacent channel selectivity of high-performance receivers used in radars, electronic wars and communication equipment.




Fig. 1.14 Application of S1465 series signal generator in High-performance Receiver Test





5) High power device test

The S1465-D series has output power up to 1W to allow high power devices to be tested without connecting to an external amplifier. Also, it overcomes the test system loss and provides higher signal power accuracy and stability.

6) Excitation signal and local oscillator substitution

The S1465 series signal generator has extremely pure signal quality and high output power, making it suitable for signal excitation of various amplifiers and an ideal substitution as a local oscillator for the one in devices under test such as the transmitter, receiver, etc.



1.2.1.2 Safety signs in the manual

For the purpose of this manual, the following safety warning signs are used to remind the user of operating the instrument safely and paying attention to relevant information:





1.2.1 Operation status and position

Before instrument operation, please pay attention to the followings:

- Unless otherwise indicated, the environment where the instrument is operated shall reach Grade 3 according to GJB3947A-2009. Non-working temperature: -40°C - +70°C; working temperature: 0°C - 50°C; relative humidity: (5%-95%) ±5%RH; random vibration: Frequency 5 -100 Hz, PSD 0.015g²/Hz; frequency 100 - 137Hz, slope -6dB; frequency 137 - 350Hz, PSD 0.0075g²/Hz; frequency 350 - 500Hz, slope -6dB; frequency 500Hz, PSD 0.0039g²/Hz; function impact: 20g half-sine shock; drop when inclined: Taking one side as the fulcrum, lift the opposite side of the base by 10cm to let it free fall on the test bench.
- 2) Do not place the instrument on a surface with water or an unfixed item such as a car, cabinet, table or others not meeting the weight condition. Please place and fix the instrument reliably on the surface of a solid object (e.g. anti-static workbench).
- 3) Do not place the instrument on the surface of a radiating object (e.g. radiator). The ambient temperature in which the instrument works should not exceed the value given in the section regarding description of relevant indicators of the product. Overheating of the product will result in electric shock, fire and other hazards.
- 4) Warm-up: in the event of cold start, warm up the instrument for 30min; at a stable ambient temperature, warm up for 2h to reach internal temperature equilibrium. Warm up the instrument by keeping it at ambient temperature for 2h, and perform calibration, then all the performance indicators shall be satisfied.

1.2.2 Electrical safety

Electrical safety precautions of the instrument:

- 1) Before turning on the instrument, ensure that the supply voltage matches the indicated supply voltage of the apparatus.
- 2) With reference to the power requirements on the instrument's rear panel, a three-core power cord is used to ensure reliable grounding of the power wire during use. Poor floating or grounding may cause damage to the instrument or harm to the user.
- 3) Do not damage the power cord; otherwise leakage will occur, which may damage the instrument and even cause injury to the operator. If an external power cord or terminal board is used, check it before use to ensure the electrical safety.
- 4) If the power outlet is not equipped with ON/OFF switch, the instrument can be directly unplugged for deenergization. For this purpose, it is necessary to ensure that the instrument can be plugged and unplugged conveniently.
- 5) Do not use a damaged power cord. It is necessary to check the integrity and safety of the power cord before connecting it to the instrument, and place it reasonably to avoid the influence due to human factors, e.g. the operator is tripped by an excessively long power cord.



- 6) The outlet should be kept clean and tidy, and the plug and outlet should be contacted properly and firmly.
- 7) The outlet and power cord should not be overloaded; otherwise, fire or electric shock will be caused.
- 8) Unless otherwise permitted, the instrument enclosure should not be opened; otherwise, the internal circuits and components will be exposed, causing unnecessary damage or injury.
- 9) If the instrument needs to be fixed at the test site, a protective ground wire should be installed between the test site and the instrument by a qualified electrician.
- 10) Appropriate overload protection measures should be taken to avoid instrument damage or personal injury caused by overload voltage (in the event of lightning for example).
- 11) When the instrument enclosure is opened, do not place other foreign objects into the case; otherwise a short circuit may be easily caused, resulting in instrument damage or personal injury.
- 12) Unless otherwise stated, the instrument not subject to waterproof treatment should not be exposed to liquid, lest instrument damage or even personal injury should occur.
- 13) Do not place the instrument in an environment that is prone to fogging. For example, if the instrument is moved in an alternate cooling and heating environment, water droplets will be formed on the instrument, causing electric shock and other hazards.

1.2.3 Operation precautions

- 1) The instrument operator should have certain professional technical knowledge, good psychological quality and certain ability of emergency response.
- 2) Before moving or transporting the instrument, please refer to the relevant instructions in "2.2.7 Transport" of this section.
- 3) If the instrument operator suffers from allergy (e.g. rash, frequent sneezing, red eyes, or breathing difficulty) during operation due to the inevitable use of substances (such as nickel) that may cause personal allergy in the process of production of the instrument, please seek medical advice promptly to find the cause and resolve the symptom.
- 4) Before disassembling the instrument for disposal, please refer to the relevant instructions of "2.2.8 Disposal/environmental protection "of this section.
- 5) As the radio frequency instrument will produce a high level of electromagnetic radiation, a pregnant woman and an operator with a heart pacemaker need special protection. If the radiation level is high, appropriate measures can be taken to remove the radiation source to avoid personal injury.
- 6) The instrument will release toxic substances once catching fire. For this reason, the operator should wear suitable PPEs (such as protective mask and cloth), just in case.
- 7) EMC grade: instruments with option H90 shall meet the requirements of 3.9.2 in GJB 3947A-2009, and those without H90 meet the requirements of 3.9.1 in GJB 3947A-2009.

1.2.4 Maintenance

- 1) Other persons than those authorized technicians who have received professional technical trainings are not allowed to open the instrument case. Before performing such operation, it is necessary to disconnect the power cord to prevent instrument instrument or even personal injury.
- 2) The instrument should be repaired, replaced or maintained by a professional electronic engineer designated by the manufacturer. The replaced and maintained part should be subject to safety test to ensure safe use of the product in the future.

1.2.5 Battery or power module

1) The instrument has power consumption of 400W maximum, supply of 50Hz - 60Hz and single phase of 110V or 220V adaptive. The steady-state power conditions meet the requirements of 3.5.1.3 in GJB3947A-2009, and the persmissible range of steady-state voltage and frequency is ±10% and ±5% of the rating, respectively.



1.2.6 Transportation

- 1) If the instrument is heavy, please move it carefully, and if necessary, use an aid (such as crane) to move the instrument so as to avoid body damage.
- 2) The instrument handle is suitable for personal handling, and it should not be used to fix the instrument on the carrier for transportation. To prevent property damage or personal injury, please transport the equipment based on the safety regulations specified by the manufacturer.
- 3) When operating the equipment on a transport vehicle, the driver must be cautious to ensure the safety of transport. The manufacturer is not responsible for any unforeseen circumstances during the transport process. Therefore, please do not operate the apparatus when it is being transported. In addition, safety measures should be reinforced in order to ensure that the product is transported safely.

1.2.7 Disposal/environmental protection

2 Start Guide

This chapter contains precautions before use, overview of front and rear panels, common basic configuration methods and data file management of S1465 series signal generator, so that the user can have a preliminary knowledge about the instrument and configuration process. The content contained in this chapter is consistent with that in relevant chapters of Quick Start Guide.

2.1 Preparation before use

2.1.1 Preparations before operation

This chapter introduces the precautions before initial setting and use of the S1465 series signal generator.

WARN

Damage prevention

To avoid the electric shock, fire and personal injury:

- > Do not open the chassis without authorization;
- Do not attempt to dismantle or modify any part not described in this manual. Improper removal may cause the deterioration of electromagnetic shielding effectiveness, damage of internal parts, etc. and affect the reliability of product. If the product is under warranty, we will no longer provide the unpaid repairs.
- Carefully read the relevant content in "1.2 Safety guide" and the following precautions for operational safety, and pay attention to the specific operating environment requirements involved on the data page.

CAUTION

ESD protection

Pay attention to the ESD protection measures in the workplace to avoid the damage to instrument. For details, please refer to the relevant content in "1.2 Safety guide"/

NOTE

Effect of electromagnetic interference (EMI):

The electromagnetic interference can affect the configuration results, therefore, it is necessary to:

- Select appropriate shielded cables, For example, use RF shielded twisted pair/network connection cable.
- Close the opened and temporarily unused cable connection port or connect the matched load to the connection port in time;
- > Take note of the electromagnetic compatibility (EMC) grade in the reference data pages.



CAUTION

During instrument operation, please pay attention to the following aspects:

An improper operating position or configuration setting can damage the instrument or appliances connected to it. Before powering on the instrument, please pay attention to the followings:

- Ensure that the fan blades and vents are unobstructed and keep the instrument at least 10 cm away from the wall.
- Keep the instrument dry;
- Place the instrument horizontally and reasonably;
- Ensure that the surrounding temperature is in accordance with the requirements on the reference data page.
- Ensure that the port input signal power is within the indicated range;
- > Ensure that the signal output port is properly connected and isn't overloaded.

2.1.1.1 Unpacking

1) Visual inspection

Step 1 Check if there is any damage in the outer packaging and the anti-vibration packaging of the instrument. If no damage is found, keep the packaging in case of future need and continue the inspection as per the following steps;

Step 2 Unpack the instrument and check for any damage to the main unit and attached items;

Step 3 Verify the items in the packaging box carefully by cross-checking with Table 2.1;

Step 4 If the outer packing box, instrument or any attached item is damaged or incorrect, it is forbidden to power on! Please contact our service center via the service hotline indicated on the cover, and we will make repairs and replacements rapidly based on individual circumstances.

CAUTION

Handling: As the instrument and its packing carton are heavy, they should be moved by two persons at the same time and be handled with care.

2.1.1.2 Environmental requirements

The operating place of the S1465 series signal generator should meet the following environmental requirements:

1) Operating environment

The operating environment should satisfy the following requirements:

CAUTION

The above environmental requirements are only defined for the operating environment of the instrument and are not within the scope of specifications.

2) Radiation requirements

To ensure that the operating environment temperature of the instrument is within the required range, the following radiation requirements should be met:

3) ESD protection

The static electricity is destructive to electronic components and equipment. Generally, we will use two anti-static measures, including combination of conductive table mat and wrist combination as well as combination of conductive floor mat and ankle strap. If these two combinations are used together, a good anti-static protection can be provided. If the combination is used separately, only the former can provide protection. For the safety of users, anti-static components must provide an isolation resistance of at least 1 M Ω to the ground.

Please correctly use the following anti-static measures to reduce electrostatic damage:

- > Ensure that all instruments are correctly grounded to prevent electrostatic generation.
- Before connecting the coaxial cable to the instrument, contact its inner and outer conductors with the ground temporarily;
- The staff shall wear anti-static wrist straps or adopt other anti-static measures before contacting joints and core wires or carrying out any assembly operation.

WARNING

Operating voltage range

The above anti-static measures can't be taken in a place where the voltage exceeds 500 V.

2.1.1.3 Power on/off

1) Precautions before power-on

It is necessary to check the following items before powering on the instrument:



a) Confirmation of power supply parameters

The S1465 series signal generator features an 110V/220V adaptive AC power module which allows either one to be used optionally. In this case, the AC power module is self-adaptive, that is, it automatically switches the operating state according to external AC supply voltage. Therefore, please look through the power requirements of rear panel before using the instrument. Table 3.4 lists the requirements for external power supply when the signal generator is in normal operation.

NOTE

Prevention against mutual interference of power supplies

To avoid instrument hardware damage caused by the interference by the power supply of other equipment, especially the spike pulse interference generated by high-power equipment, it is recommended to use a 220 V or 110 V AC regulated power supply to power the signal generator.

b) Confirmation and connection of power cord

The S1465 series signal generator uses a 3-core power cord interface that complies with the national safety standard. Before the signal generator is powered on, it must be confirmed that the protective ground wire of the power cord has been reliably grounded. Floating or poor grounding may damage the instrument and even injure the operator. It is prohibited to use a power cord without a protective ground. When connected to a suitable power socket, the power cord realizes grounding of the instrument enclosure. The power cord should have a rated voltage greater than or equal to 250 V and a rated current greater than or equal to 6A.

When connecting the instrument to the power cord:

Step 1. Confirm that the power cord is undamaged;

Step 2. Use the power cord to connect the rear panel power plug and the properly-grounded 3-core power socket.



Grounding

Poor or incorrect grounding may cause instrument damage and even personal injury. Before powering on the signal generator, make sure that the ground wire is in good contact with the power supply ground wire.

Please use the power socket with a protective ground. Do not replace the protective ground wire with an external cable, power cord or autotransformer without grounding protection. If an autotransformer is required, the common terminal must be connected to the protective ground of the power connector.



2) First power-on

The methods and precautions for instrument power-on/power-off are as follows:

a) Connection of power supply

Before power-on for the first time, please conform the power supply parameters and power cord. For details, please refer to the section -2.3.1.1.3 Precautions before power "on" in this manual.

Step 1: Connect the power cord. Use the power line in the packing box that matches with the instrument or an acceptable three-core power line. Connect one end to the power socket of rear panel (see Fig.2.1) (the required voltage parameter indicators are indicated near the power socket to remind users to use acceptable voltage) and the other end to acceptable AC power.

Step 2: Turn on the rear panel power button: As shown in Fig.2.2, observe that STANDBY indicator lamp above the front panel power button (see Fig.2.3) turns yellow.

Step 3: Turn on the front panel power button: As shown in Fig.2.3, do not connect any device to the instrument before powering it on. Do not power on the instrument until all goes well. Then, the indicator lamp above the front panel power button will turn green.

Step 3: The front panel UI will gradually display the information about the startup process:

First it briefly displays the manufacturer information and then enters the operating system menu. There are two options in this menu. Normally, users do not have to operate the menu. Windows 7 automatically starts up when the timer counts up to 0.

Step 4: After successful startup, Windows 7 automatically runs the initializer to show the main operating interface.

Now the instrument is operational.

NOTE

10MHz time base and warm-up

In the event of cold start, warm up the instrument for a period of time in order to make 10MHz time base is at the operating temperature. There is no need to warm up the instrument when starting it from the standby state. To perform the indicator test, warm up the instrument for 0.5h in advance. (For details, please refer to the relevant instructions in the specifications).

NOTE

Initialization of attenuator

After entering the host program, a sound of position setting can be heard during initialization of the attenuator, in this case, do not mistake it for instrument malfunction.



CAUTION

System startup

Windows + x86 control platform is adopted to eliminate the need for user intervention, turning off the power and modifying the settings in BIOS during BIOS self test and Windows loading. **ii. Power-off**

Step 1: Turn off the power button at the bottom left corner of front panel (see. Fig.2.3), now the instrument enters the power-off process (power shall not be turned off until software and hardware are processed) and power is turned off after a few seconds. In this case, the power indicator lamp above the power button turns from green to yellow.

Step 2: Turn off the rear panel power button ("O") or disconnect the power connection.

The instrument is switched off.

CAUTION

Power-off

When the instrument is in normal working status, it can only be powered off through operation of the front panel power button. Do not directly turn off the rear panel power button or disconnect the power connection to the instrument, or else, the instrument cannot enter normal shutdown mode and will be damaged, or lose its current status/configuration data. Please correctly power off the instrument.

c) Disconnection of power supply

In an emergency, immediately cut off power in order to avoid personal injury. Just unplug the power line from AC power socket or rear panel power socket. To this end, leave ample working space for operating the instrument to directly cut off power when necessary.

2.1.1.4 Correct use of connector

Connectors are frequently used in various tests. Although connectors of calibration kits, testing cables and analyzer measuring ports are designed and manufactured in accordance with the highest standard, yet all of them have limited useful life. Wear is unavoidable in normal use and can make the connector performance degrade or even unable to meet the measurement requirement, therefore, correct maintenance and measurement connections not only provide accurate and repeatable measurement results but also prolong the useful life, reduce the measurement cost. Note the following aspects during actual use:

1) Check of connectors

It is necessary to wear an anti-static wrist strap when checking the connectors. It is recommended to use a magnifier to check:

- 1) the electroplated surface for wear and deep scratches;
- 2) the thread for deformation;
- 3) the thread and joint surface for metallic particles;
- 4) the inner conductor for bending and breakage;
- 5) the screw for improper rotation.



CAUTION

Check the connectors so as not to damage the instrument ports

Any damaged connector may damage the good one connected to it even if it is connected for the first time. To protect the ports of the signal generator, it is necessary to check the connectors before operating them.

2) Connection

The connectors should be checked and cleaned before measurement and connection to ensure that they are clean and undamaged. It is necessary to wear an anti-static wrist strap during connection. The correct connection methods and procedures are as follows:

Step 1. As shown in Fig.2.4, align the axis of both devices to be connected to ensure the pins of male connector can concentrically slide into the holes of female connect;




Fig.2.5 Connection

Step 2. As shown in Fig.2.5, move both connectors straight together, so that they can be connected smoothly; rotate the threaded sleeve of connector (rather than the connector itself) until it is tightened; during connection, there can be no relative rotary motion both connectors;




Fig.2.6 Completion of Final Connection with a Torque Wrench

Step 3. As shown in Fig.2.6, use a torque wrench to complete the final connection. It should be noted that the torque wrench should not exceed the starting kick point. An auxiliary wrench can be used to prevent the connectors from rotation.

3) Disconnection

Step 1. Support the connectors to prevent any of the connectors from being twisted, shaken or bent;

Step 2. Use one open end wrench to prevent the main body of the connectors from rotating;

Step 3. Use another wrench to loosen the screw on the connector.


Step 4. Loosen the screw by hand until the connection is completely broken. Step 5. Separate

the connectors by pulling them apart in parallel.

4) Use of the torque wrench

The torque wrench should be used as indicated in Fig.2.7. Please pay attention to the following points when using the torque wrench:

- Confirm that the torque of the torque wrench is set correctly before use;
- Ensure that the angle between the torque wrench and the other wrench (used to support the connector or cable) is less than 90° before applying a force;
- Gently grasp the end of the torque wrench handle and apply a force in the direction perpendicular to the handle until the breakout torque of the wrench is reached.

5) Use and preservation of connectors

- a) Protect the connectors with a protective sheath when not used;
- b) Do not place the various connectors, air lines and calibration standards disorderly in a box; otherwise the connectors will be damaged;
- c) Keep the connector and analyzer at the same temperature. If the connector is held by hand or cleaned with compressed air, the temperature will be significantly changed. The connector can be used for calibration only after its temperature is stabilized;
- d) Do not touch the joint surface of the connector because it is difficult to remove skin oil and dust particles from the joint surface;
- e) Do not place the contact surface of the connector downwards onto a hard surface; otherwise, the electroplated layer and joint surface of the connector may be damaged.
- f) Wear an anti-static wrist strap and work on a grounded conductive workbench mat to protect the analyzer and connector against electrostatic discharge.

6) Cleaning of connectors

It is necessary to wear an anti-static wrist strap when cleaning the connectors as per the following steps:

- a) Use clean low-pressure air to remove the loose particles on the thread and joint surface of the connector and check the connectors thoroughly. If further cleaning is required, proceed as follows;
- b) Wet (but not soak) a lint-free cotton swab with isopropyl alcohol;
- c) Use a cotton swab to remove dirt and debris from the joint surface and thread of the connector. When cleaning the inner surface, be careful not to apply an external force to the central inner conductor or leave the cotton swab fibers on the central conductor of the connector;
- d) Evaporate the alcohol and then blow the surface clean with compressed air;
- e) Check the connectors to confirm that they are free of particles and residues;
- f) If the connector still has visible defects after cleaning, it indicates that the connector may be damaged. Never use a damaged connector, and confirm the causes of damage before measurement and connection.

7) Use of adapter

When the measuring port of analyzer is different from the type of connector used, an adapter must be adopted for measurement connection. In addition, even if the measurement port of the analyzer is the same as the type of connector for the port of tested part, it is also a good idea to use an adapter. Under these two conditions, the measuring port can be protected, thus extending its service life and reducing the maintenance cost. Before connecting the adapter to the measuring port of analyzer, it should be carefully checked and cleaned. A high-quality adapter should be used to reduce the impact of mismatch on the measurement accuracy.

8) Joint surface of connector

An important concept in microwave measurement is the reference surface for all measurement. In the case of calibration, the reference surface is defined as the surface on which the measuring port and the calibration standard arejointed. Proper connection and calibration depend on whether the connectors can be completely and straightly contact with each other at each point of the joint surface.



Joint surface




Fig.2.8 Calibration Surface

2.1.1.5 User checks

After the initial power-up of the S1465 series signal generator, it is necessary to check whether the instrument is functioning properly in order to continue measurements.

NOTE

Instructions on using the hard keys on the front panel and the soft menu keys.

- 1) Hard key: 【XXX】, XXX denotes the name of the hard key.
- 2) Soft key: Soft key: [XXX], XXX denotes the name of the soft key

1) Self-test

Power on the S1465 series signal generator, and check that the power indicator lamp above the power button at the bottom left corner of front panel turns yellow, now the standby power supply is working properly. Press the power button on the front panel, observe that the power indicator lamp on the front panel turns green and the display backlight lights up, and wait for about 30 s to display the power-on status interface.

After warming up the signal generator for 10min, set it by following the steps below:

Step 1. Press the [System] key on the front panel or click the [System] function area on the interface to enter the system menu;

Step 2. Select [Instrument Self Test] in the self test option;

Step 3. In the pop-up Self Test Config Dialog, select self test items and click [Start Test], then observe the test result: If the test is successful, a message "All pass self test" will be displayed, indicating the instrument is working properly; if not, a message "Self test failed in XX" will be displayed, indicating the instrument is not working properly. In this case, contact our service consultation center via the contact provided on front cover II or in "6.4 Repair method" for quick repair or replacement depending on the situation.

2) Functional verification

Start and warm up the instrument for at least 30min, and apply a matched load to RF output. Set the instrument as below:

Step 1. Press the 【Amplitude】 key on the front panel or click the [Amplitude] function area on the interface to enter the Power menu and set the power to 0dBm in the pop-up Power Parameter Setting Dialog.

Step 2. Press the [Frequency] key on the front panel or click the [Frequency] function area on the interface to enter the Frequency menu and set CW to 100MHz in the pop-up Frequency Parameter Setting Dialog.

Step 3. Press the 【RF ON/OFF】 key on the front panel or click the [RF] function area on the interface to turn on the RF output;

Step 4. Press the arrow keys on the front panel to set the frequency in increments of 100MHz until the maximum value is reached. Then observe whether there is any alarm indication in the



alarm indication zone on the front panel display. If not, it means the instrument is working properly; otherwise, the instrument is not functional normally, in such case, please contact our service consultation center via the contact provided on front cover II or in "6.4 Repair method" for quick repair or replacement depending on the situation.

2.1.2 Configuration of operating system

This chapter introduces the operating system and methods of configuration and maintenance of the S1465 series signal generator. To ensure that software is functional properly, please refer to the following notes about the operating system:

2.1.2.1 Description of instrument software

The host software of the S1465 series signal generator works with Windows 7 and has been installed and configured according to the requirements for instrument features. The host software is based on Windows 7 and has been installed before delivery.

2.1.2.2 Windows 7 usage

The administrator account has the permissions to:

- > install third-party software;
- configure network and printer;
- read and write any files on the hard disk;
- add and delete user accounts and passwords;
- reconfigure Windows settings;
- > run other applications.

CAUTION

Third-party software may affect the instrument's performance:

S1465 series signal generator is equipped with open Windows environment, and installing other third-party software may affect the signal generator's performance Only software tested by the manufacturer and compatible with the main unit software can be run.

2.1.2.3 Windows 7 configuration

Before delivery, the operating system of S1465 series signal generator has been optimized to the best configuration, and any changes in the OS settings may cause a decrease in the performance of the instrument. Generally, no changes need to be made for Windows OS settings.

CAUTION

The BIOS settings cannot be changed

As the signal generator has been set in BIOS, the user should not modify the settings in BIOS, otherwise it will cause abnormal startup or operation of the instrument.

In order to facilitate the measurement reporting and system integration, user can change the following items as needed.



1) Configuring USB equipment

The S1465 series signal generator is provided with USB ports on front and rear panels for connecting USB devices directly. If there are no enough USB ports, USB hubs may be used to meet the demands.

USB equipment which can be connected include:

- Hot-plug USB memory for updating data;
- CD-ROM drive for installing firmware and programs;
- Keyboard and mouse for editing data and operating the instrument;
- > Printer for outputting measurement results.

The Windows 7 operating system supports plug-and-play devices, so it is convenient to install USB devices, and when a device is connected to USB port, Windows 7 will automatically search for matching device drivers. If no available driver is found, the system will prompt to find the driver directory to complete the installation.

If the USB equipment is removed from the USB port, Windows 7 will automatically detect a change to the hardware configuration and unload the relevant driver. Insertion or extraction of USB equipment does not affect the operating state of the instrument.

The USB equipment shall be connected as follows:

a) Connecting memory or CD-ROM drive

If the memory or CD-ROM drive is installed successfully, Windows 7 system will prompt "The device has been installed successfully and is ready to use" and automatically display the path name and prompt (e.g. "F:").

b) Printer

Windows7 will automatically detect the USB keyboard connected and set the input language to default —Chinese (China) – Simplified Chinese – American Keyboard. The keyboard properties can be configured through — Begin > Control Panel > Clock, Language and Region > Region and Language > Change Keyboard or Other Input Method.

c) Connecting mouse

Windows 7 will automatically detect the mouse connected to the instrument. The mouse properties can be configured through -Begin > Control Panel > Hardware and Sound > Devices and Printers > Mouse.

d) Printer

Use Windows Control Panel to configure printers. Using an external USB mouse and an external USB keyboard makes the printer configuration easier. If you need to install a new printer, you only need to install the printer's driver. The printer manufacturer will provide the printer installer. You can also install the driver through the external USB optical drive.

2) Configuring GPIB

The user may need to modify the GPIB address when building a system with a signal generator. The GPIB address of the machine is 19 by default.

The method to change the GPIB address is as follows: Press the **[** System **]** key on the front panel or click the [System] function area on the screen to select [GPIB Port] and enter an interface as shown in Fig.2.9. Then modify the address in GPIG address bar in the Configuration Dialog by using number keys on the front panel or touching the screen.

3) Configuring network

a) Changing host name

The host name (computer name) of S1465 series signal generator is preset as 41-PC before delivery. To avoid duplication of name in a network, users can change the host name at their own discretion when multiple instruments are connected in a network. The host name shall be changed by following the steps below: (or by reference to Microsoft Windows 7 help document.)

Step 1: Press the 【System】 key or click the [System] function area on the screen to select [LAN Port] and enter the Network Properties Setting page as shown in Fig.2.10, where the current LAN "Host Name" is displayed.

Step 2. Edit and enter a new host name, and close the current dialog.

b) Configuration of IP Address, Subnet Mask and Default Gateway

The IP address and gateway are preset to be automatically obtained as default before delivery. The IP address, subnet mask and default gateway can be changed manually. The IP address, subnet mask and default gateway can be changed in the dialog shown in Fig.2.10, as detailed in the steps in the above "a) Changing the host name" or by reference to Microsoft Windows 7 help document.

c) Changing system firewall settings

The firewall is used to prevent unauthorized users from operating the instrument remotely. Therefore, it is recommended by the manufacturer to open the firewall protection. The firewall protection connected to the system and all ports related to remote operation is enabled before delivery.

Only the administrator has the permission to change the firewall settings.

2.1.2.4 Windows 7 system security and maintenance

1) Antivirus software

Installing antivirus software may have some negative effects on the performance of the instrument, and it is strongly advised that users do not to use the instrument as a common computer to browse or transfer documents so as not to get infected with virus.

Before using USB mobile storage devices, a computer with the latest antivirus software should be used to process these mobile devices to kill virus may exist and ensure that they do not become a viral carrier.

Once the system platform of the signal generator is infected with viruses, the viruses will have a negative impact on the operation and use of the instrument. It is recommended that the user should carry out the system recovery in such a case. See "2) System maintenance" for the system recovery operations.

2) System maintenance

a) Windows 7 Backup

It is suggested that the user should backup the system regularly, and the instrument data and system can be completely backed up by using the "System Recovery Tool" of this instrument. For the specific operation, refer to "System Backup and Recovery".

Before using the instrument for other purposes other than normal use such as long-term Internet connection and installing third-party software, it is recommended to backup the instrument system to avoid accidental inflection of virus and other operations harmful to the system.

The Windows 7 operating system has the same data backup function that can backup all data on the instrument and create a system disk that can be used to restore Windows in case of serious failure.

For more information, refer to the Help and Reference functions of Windows 7. Additionally, third party backup software can be used, but there is a need to ensure that this software does not conflict with the instrument's system software. It is recommended to backup the system data on external devices such as a network hard drive or USB hard drive.

b) Windows 7 system recovery

Windows 7 has the system recovery function that can restore the system to the state of a previous moment. However, the built-in system backup recovery function of Window cannot work successfully every time, so it's not recommended to use this backup program.

3) Partitions and use of hard disk

The hard disk has three partitions: "C:", 'D:" and 'E:".

Disk C is a system disk containing Windows 7 operating system.

Disk D stores the instrument applications and data. It can also install third-party software to disk D. Disk D is a sole drive for program backup and recovery.

Disk E is mainly used for data backup and storage. It contains system data on disk C, instrument data



on disk D and software data backup stored by users. Backup data in Disk E can be copied to external storage media so that even the hard drive needs to be replaced, only the backup data will be recovered to the new hard drive.

2.1.2.5 System backup & recovery

1) Hard drive OS or data recovery

The signal generator's hard drive recovery system can used to fix software errors on Disk C (may be caused by loss of system files or data) or recover the original factory data.

Recovery of original factory data will affect on the following entries:

User-defined Windows 7 settings, such as newly added user accounts, need to be reset after system recovery;

> Other third-party software installed by users needs to be re-installed after system recovery.

The data generated during configuration should be stored in the Disk D; it is recommended to periodically transfer the data to a computer or other storage media through local network connections.

2) How to use the instrument recovery program

Step 1. Check if the instrument is shut down.

Step 2. Plug a standard keyboard into the USB interface on the rear panel.

Step 3. Switch on the instrument and after the display of manufacturer information, an OS menu with timer appears:

When the timer counts down to 0, use the Up/down arrows on the standard keyboard to highlight the [System Recovery Tool] and press Enter after selecting it.

Step 4. Perform the recovery in the recovery program screen as below:

- 1) Select and run GHOST 8.2 wizard tool shelf and wait to enter the prompt interface of next action. Select Item 5 to start GHOST 8.2 manual operation and wait to enter GHOST 8.2 operating interface, and press Enter when a dialog with OK button appears.
- 2) Select Local→Partition→From Image; in the OpenFileDialog, activate the "File name" input box by using the Tab key and enter d:\system.gho.
- 3) In the pop-up SelectSourcePartition and SelectFile Dialog, switch to click OK by using the Tab key and press Enter. In the pop-up SelectObjectDeviceDialog, switch to click OK by using the Tab key and press Enter. In the pop-up SelectObjectPartitionDialog, select Partition 1, and switch to click OK by using the Tab key and press Enter.
- 4) In the Alert & Confirmation Dialog, select Yes and press Enter.
- 5) The the system recovery finishes, reboot as prompted.

Step 5. After the instrument reboots, the system will be restored to the status of last backup.

Step 6. After system recovery, we recommend that users do a self test on the instrument after it runs steadily 30 min after startup to check for errors.

2.1.3 Routine maintenance

This section introduces the routine maintenance method of the S1465 series signal generator.

2.1.3.1 Cleaning method

1) Cleaning of instrument surface

Clean the instrument surface as per the following steps:

Step 1. Power off the instrument, and disconnect the power cord from the instrument;

Step 2. Gently wipe the surface with dry or slightly moistened soft cloth. Do not wipe the inside of the instrument.

Step 3. Do not use chemical cleaning agents such as alcohol, acetone, or dilutable cleaning



agents.

2) Cleaning of display

After the instrument is used for a period of time, it is necessary to clean the LED. Please operate according to the following steps:

Step 1. Power off the instrument, and disconnect the power cord from the instrument;

Step 2. Use clean soft cotton cloth dampened with cleaning agents to gently wipe the display panel;

Step 3. Dry the display with clean soft cotton cloth;

Step 4. Connect the power cord after the display is dried completely.

CAUTION

Clean the display

There is a layer of ESD protection coating on the surface of the display, so never use any cleaning agent containing fluoride, acid or alkali. Do not spray the cleaning agent directly onto the display panel, otherwise the cleaning agent may leak into the internal of the instrument, causing damages.

2.1.3.2 Maintenance of testing port

The front panel of S1465 series signal generator has a type N (female) or 3.5mm/ 2.4mm/ 1.85mm (male) port and several BNC ports (female). A damaged connector or dust inside will affect RF band test result. Therefore, maintain such connectors in a manner as described below:

- > Connectors shall be kept clean and away from dust;
- > To prevent ESD, do not directly contact the connector surface;
- Do not use a damaged connector;
- > Clean connectors with a dryer, and do not grind the surface with a tool like abrasive paper.

CAUTION

Impedance matching of ports

The front RF ports for S1465 series signal generator are 50Ω type-N (female) or 3.5mm/2.4mm/1.85mm (male) connectors. Using a connector with unmatched impedance will cause damage to it.

2.2 Description of front and rear panels

This section presents the composition and functions of front and rear panels for the S1465 series signal generator.

2.2.1 Description of front panel




Fig.2.11 Front panel

This section introduces the composition and functions of front panel of S1465 series signal generator, which is illustrated below (Fig.2.11) and itemized in Table 2.5:




Fig.2.12 Rear Panel


This section presents basic settings and configuration methods of the S1465 series signal generator.


2.3.1 Description of basic settings

This section introduces the main features of UI and basic methods of configuration settings of S1465 series signal generator, which will be used in subsequent different configuration tasks.

2.3.3.1 Main features of operating interface

The front panel LED display is used for showing the UI which is a new-type visual GUI clearly displaying the whole process of signal output. The operating interface is divided into different areas according to the function modules and allows concurrent operation of multiple modules, display of states, parameter settings and configuration results of all configuration tasks. This section focuses on the composition and functions of UI. The operating interface is illustrated below (Fig.2.13) and itemized in Table 2.7:

2.3.1.2 Common methods of configuration

NOTE

The instrument supports operation by screen touch or front panel.

The GUI of S1465 series signal generator can be operated by screen touch or front panel, and the following sections describe the operation of common settings. Method 1 is operation by screen touch, and method 2 is by front panel.

[RF ON/OF] operation 1)

Method 1: Click the [RF] function area OFF screen to turn on RF and click this button to turn it off.

Method 2: Press the **[**RF ON/OF**]** key on the front panel to switch on or off RF.

2) Setting the frequency of CW

Frequency **Method 1:** Click the [Frequency] function area in the configuration information display area on the screen to open the Frequency Configuration Dialog; click the [CW] edit box which

is selected, enter a value and press the unit key.

Method 2: Press the [Frequency] on the front panel to open the Frequency Configuration Dialog, turn the knob (RPG) on the front panel to select an entry. An entry is selected when a vellow-lined box appears around [CW].

Finally, enter a value by a key on the front panel and press the unit key.

Note: It is a must to press the unit key or Enter to end typing after all numeric values are entered.

Increasing (decreasing) the frequency of CW 3)

The frequency of CW can be output after setting a fixed value or increased (decreased) in a digit position by using arrow keys (knob). For example, in the CW option, move the cursor by using left and right arrow keys to select a digit position to be changed, and change the value in the currently selected position so as to switch frequency at fast step.



Additionally, in the CW option, move the cursor to the far left and wait for the cursor to disappear, then press up and down arrow keys or the knob to increase or decrease the CW input at the preset step.





4) Selecting a configuration dialog

Method 1: Click a corresponding button in the instrument configuration area on the screen to open the corresponding configuration dialog. For example, clicking the [Power] function area will open the Ampl Config Dialog. Operations related to power setting can be performed in this dialog.

Method 2: Press a corresponding key on the front panel to open the corresponding configuration dialog. For example, pressing the 【Amplitude】 key on the front panel will open the Ampl Config Dialog.

5) ON/OFF button control

The operation is described by taking the "Freq Ref Switch" for example:

Method 1: Click the button on the screen to switch on or off the frequency reference.

Method 2: Turn the front panel knob and press it when it is selected to switch on or off the frequency reference.



The blue block indicates the currently selected status.

6) Drop-down box operation

Method 1: Click the drop-down box control on the screen to expand the box and select an entry by touching an input.



7) Editing data

Data input contains two parts: data input and unit selection. Selecting different units will indicate data in different units of precision.



The operating data can be entered by screen touch or number keys on the front panel.

Method 1: Click the 'Freq Start" data input box area to make frequency 'Editable", then enter data and edit it.

Method 2: Turn the front panel knob, when the 'Freq Start' data input box is selected, press the knob to make the box 'Editable', then enter data and edit it. After editing, press the knob again to make the data input box selected, and then operate other controls by turning the knob.

NOTE

Focus order of input box

To facilitate user input, the focus order of data input box is put in the first place among the focus orders of all controls in the current configuration dialog, that is, the data input box is directly editable when a configuration dialog is opened.

8) Editing list

The S1465 series signal generator has a list editing function whereby the list of information needs to be



manually edited. The list is illustrated in Fig.2.14. The list has embedded input and switch controls. Drop-down box control, button control.

Method 1: A list cell can be edited by clicking it on the screen, which can be input box control or switch control. Drop-down box control, button control. The editing methods of these controls are the same as those described in 1) - 7).

9) Shortcut operations

The main interface supports shortcut operations of modulation ON/OFF and working mode. The instrument status can be fast switched by screen touch. There is a prompt display of current status information on the left of each function module, as shown in Fig.2.15.

2.3.2 Example of operation

This section gives step-by-step instructions on common but important basic settings and functions of the instrument and aims to enable quicker learning of instrument features and basic configuration methods.

Firstly, make preparations before operation by following the steps below:

Step 1. Power on the instrument;

Step 2. Initialize the system settings;

Step 3. Warm it up for 10min;

Step 4. Proceed as follows when no error message appears on the main interface.

Description

The following instructions are given by taking the operation of front panel and screen touch for example.

2.3.2.1 Setting RF output of CW

1) Setting RF output frequency

Example: Set RF output frequency to 500MHz and increase or decrease it by 1MHz each time.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Reset.

Press the **[**Reset **]** key to set the instrument to the manufacturer-specified state.



NOTE

Instrument reset state

The instrument reset condition can be set on request to the user-specified state. But the manufacturer-specified state shall be used in the following example. For details, refer to '3.4.1.1 Instrument reset state".

Step 2. RF ON.

Press 【RF ON/OFF】 or click the [RF] function area on the screen to switch on RF and output RF signals.

Now the RF ON/OFF status area on the front panel operating interface will display 'RF ON".

Step 3. Set CW to 500MHz.

Edit frequency;

Press **[**Frequency **]** or click the [Frequency] function area on the screen to display the pop-up Ampl Config Dialog;

Clockwise or (counterclockwise) turn the front panel RPG to select the Frequency input box and make it editable by pressing the knob or clicking the box on the screen. The frequency value shown in the current edit box is the system default or the value set during the last CW operation. Enter 500MHz and end typing, and then the frequency shown in the main information display area will be refreshed synchronously.

Step 4. Set the frequency step to 1MHz.

EditFreq Step.

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the front panel knob to select the Frequency Step edit box in Frequency Setting and make it editable by pressing the knob or clicking the Frequency Step edit box on the screen. Enter 1MHz and end typing.

Step 5. Increment operation

> Press arrow keys to implement step-by-step operation.

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the front panel RPG or touch the screen to select CW input box. Move the cursor in the edit box cursor to the leftmost end, and press up and down arrow keys or those on the virtual keyboard to increase CW in increments of 1MHz. Alternatively, locate the cursor in the input box to MHz, and press up and down arrow keys or those on the virtual keyboard to implement the above operation. In this case, the RF output port emits CW signals at a step of 1MHz.

Focus order of CW/Power input box

To facilitate user input, the CW/Power input box automatically becomes editable when the Frequency/Ampl Config Dialog is opened.

NOTE

Step-by-step change of parameters in input box

When the input box is editable, step-by-step change of input parameters is possible by front panel RPG or arrow keys.

2) Set frequency reference and offset

When the frequency reference is turned on, the frequency-related parameters are relative values based on the currently set frequency reference. For example: The frequency shown in the main information display area is the difference between the RF output frequency and the frequency reference.

Example: Set the frequency reference to 500MHz and offset to 100MHz.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Reset.

Press the **[**Reset**]** key to set the instrument to the manufacturer-specified state.

Step 2. Set CW to 1.5GHz and frequency reference to 500MHz.

Edit the frequency value as 1.5GHz;

Press the **[**Frequency **]** key or click the [Frequency] function area on the screen to display a pop-up Frequency Configuration Dialog on the UI; then set CW to 1.5GHz.

Edit the frequency reference as 500MHz;

Clockwise or (counterclockwise) turn the front panel RPG to select Freq Ref Switch, and turn it on by pressing the knob or touching the screen. Clockwise or (counterclockwise) turn the front panel



RPG to select the Freq Ref input box. Make the Freq Ref input box editable by pressing the knob or touching the screen; the frequency reference shown in the current edit box is the system default or the value set during the last frequency reference operation. Now enter 500MHz and end typing, then the frequency shown in the main information display area is actual RF output frequency minus the frequency reference (1GHz = 1.5GHz - 500MHz), and the frequency indicated in the main information display area is prefixed by a "reference" mark, now the "Freq Ref OFF/ON" is set to "ON".

If the frequency reference is turned off, the frequency shown in the main information display area is the actual RF output frequency.

Now the RF ON/OFF status area on the front panel operating interface shows 'RF ON".

Edit frequency offset as 100MHz;

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the front panel RPG to select the Freq Offset edit box. Make the Freq Offset edit box editable by pressing the knob or touching the screen, and enter 100MHz to set the frequency offset to 100MHz. If the frequency reference is turned off or the frequency offset is 0, the frequency value shown in the main information display area is actual RF output frequency.

3) Setting RF output power

The S1465 series signal generator provides power output of fixed amplitude in CW and sweep mode, with power ranging from -20dBm to +30dBm (-130dBm \sim +30dBm for signal generators with a step attenuator).

Example: Set the power level to 0dBm.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Reset.

Press the **[**Reset **]** key to set the instrument to the manufacturer-specified state.

Step 2. RF ON.

Press 【RF ON/OFF】 or click the [RF] function area on the screen to switch on RF and output RF signals.

Now the RF ON/OFF status area on the front panel operating interface shows 'RF ON".

Step 3. Set the power to 0dBm.

Edit the power value as 0dBm;

The power input box has a preset range of input and displays the upper and lower limits closest to the input value. If a power level out of the range of fixed-amplitude power is entered, the status display area will give a warning message indicating 'Amplitude Not Fixed''.

4) Set amplitude reference and offset

When the amplitude reference is turned on, the power-related parameters are relative values based on the currently set amplitude reference. For example: The frequency shown in the main information display area is the difference between the RF output frequency and the frequency reference.

Example: Set the power frequency to 10dBm and offset to 5dB.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Reset.

Press **[**Reset**]** to set the instrument to the manufacturer-specified state.

Step 2. Set the power to 0dBm.

Press the [Amplitude] key and turn the front panel RGP to select the Power input box or click the [Power] function box on the screen to make it editable; enter the power value of 0dBm;

Step 3. Set the amplitude reference to 10dBm.

Edit the amplitude reference as 10dBm;

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the front panel RPG to select Ampl Ref Switch, and turn on the amplitude reference by pressing the knob or clicking Power Frequency ON on the screen.

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the front panel RPG to select the Ampl Ref input box. Press the knob to make the box editable; the amplitude reference currently shown in the box is the system default or the value set during the last amplitude reference operation. Enter 10dBm and end typing. Then the power shown in the main information display area is actual RF output power minus the frequency reference -10dBm (RF output power (0dBm) – amplitude reference (10dBm)), and Ampl Ref is turned on, as shown in Fig.2.20.

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the front panel knob to select the Ampl Offset edit box in Power Setting, and make the box editable by pressing the knob or touching the screen. Set the amplitude offset to 5dB by entering 5dB.

If the amplitude reference is turned off or the amplitude offset is 0, the power value shown in the main information display area is actual RF output power.

2.3.2.2 Modulation signal

The modulating pulse of the S1465 series signal genereator supports AM, FM/PM and pulse modulation. This section presents how to turn on and set the modulating signal by taking AM and pulse modulation for example.

1) Amplitude modulation (AM)

Example: Generate an AM signal with local frequency of 3.5GHz, power of 0dBm, modulation rate of 0.001MHz and depth of 30%.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Set RF output signal:

Set CW to 3.5GHz and power level to 0dBm.

Step 2. Activate the AM Configuration Dialog:

Operate the AM Configuration Dialog that pops up on the interface by pressing the 【AM】 key or cliking [Amplitude Modulation] in [Simulation Modulation] on the screen. Alternatively, select the **[** Modulation ON/OFF] key to open the Modulation Config Dialog and switch to the AM Configuration Dialog.

Step 3. Set the AM waveform:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the AM Waveform combo box, and press the knob to activate the option, and select 'Sinc" by pressing up and down keys or clicking the AM Waveform combo box on the screen.

Step 4. Set AM type:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob and select the "OFF" option in Deep AM by pressing the knob or touching the screen.

Step 7. Set the modulation rate:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the Modulation Rate input box, and make the box editable by pressing the knob or clicking it on the screen. Enter 0.001 MHz and end typing.

Step 8. Set AM depth:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the AM Depth input box, and make the box editable by pressing the knob or clicking it on the screen. Enter 30% and end typing.

Step 9. Turn on RF.

Press 【RF ON/OFF】 or click the [Power] function area on the screen to switch on RF and output RF signals.

Now the RF ON/OFF status area on the front panel operating interface shows 'RF ON".

Step 10. Turn on AM:



Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the AM Switch option, and turn it on by pressing the knob or clicking the option on the screen. Now the modulation indication area in the

main information display area shows and the text message area tabulates AM component information, Indicating that AM is activated and the instrument is emitting amplitude-modulated signals from RF output connector.

2) Pulse modulation

The S1465 series signal generator produces modulating pulse supporting PRF jittered, staggered and sliding, and can generate complex pulse-modulated RF signals.

Example: Generate a pulse-modulated signal with local frequency of 3.5GHz, power of 0dBm, width of 50μ s and period of 1ms.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Set RF output signal:

Set CW to 3.5GHz, power level to 0dBm and 【RF ON/OFF】 to ON.

Step 2. Activate the Pulse Modulation Configuration Dialog:

Display a pop-up Pulse Modulation Configuration Dialog on the UI by pressing the [Pulse] key or cliking the [Pulse] function area on the screen.

Step 3. Set the pulse source:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the "Auto" option in the Pulse Source combo box, and select the "Auto" option by pressing the knob or clicking the option in the Pulse Source combo box on the screen.

Step 4. Set the pulse width:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the Pulse Width input box, and make the box editable by pressing the knob or clicking it on the screen. Enter 50MHz and end typing.

Step 5. Set the period:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the Period input box, and make the box editable by pressing the knob or clicking it on the screen. Enter 1ms and end typing.

Step 6. Turn on the pulse modulation:

Clockwise (or counterclockwise) turn the knob to select the Pulse Modulation Switch option, and turn it on by pressing the knob or clicking the option on the screen. Other option values in the Pulse Configuration Dialog are defaults.

Now the modulation indication area in the main information display area shows the text message area tabulates the component information of pulse modulation.

2.3.3 Description of main configuration scenarios

The function configuration modules of S1465 series signal generator correspond to their respective configuration dialogs and centrally manage the relevant parameter information to facilitate parameter setting and editing for specific functions.

2.3.3.1 Frequency


Fig.2.25 Frequency Configuration Dialog (other settings)

The Frequency Configuration Dialog is used for setting RF output frequency parameters including: CW, frequency step, frequency offset, frequency reference, etc. To facilitate user input, the selection order of CW input box is put in the first place among the selection orders of all controls in the Frequency Configuration Dialog, that is, the CW input box is directly editable when the Frequency Configuration Dialog is opened for the first time. Pressing the **[** Frequency **]** key on the front panel or clicking the [Frequency] function area on the screen will display a pop-up Frequency Configuration Dialog on UI, as shown below in Fig.2.24 and 2.25.

As seen above: In all functions relating to frequency, parameters are in Hz, digital inputs end with a frequency unit like GHz, MHz, kHz or Hz and the currently shown values and units are accepted by pressing Enter (terminator key).

Parameters in Frequency Configuration Dialog include: CW, relative frequency mode (ON/OFF), relative frequency reference, frequency offset, clock multiplier factor, setting of LF signal generator, phase reference, phase adjustment and other menus.


2.3.3.2 Amplitude

The Ampl Config Dialog is used for setting parameters relating to the power characteristics. Pressing the **[** Amplitude **]** key on the front panel or clicking the [Frequency] function area on the screen will display a pop-up Ampl Config Dialog on UI, as shown in Figures 3.26 and 3.27. Confirm an appropriate unit after completion of digital inputs to end typing. Settings in this dialog include: Power level, relative power mode (ON/OFF), relative amplitude reference setting, attenuation control, amplitude offset, amplitude step, ALC loop state ON/OFF, search style (Manu/Auto), amplitude reference, do search, search output (normal/min), amplitude level control mode, ALC band width (Man/Auto), external detector couple coefficient, output blank (ON/OFF).

2.3.3.3 Sweep









Fig.2.31 Ramp Sweep Configuration Dialog

The instrument has three sweep modes including step sweep, list sweep and ramp sweep. Pressing the **[**Sweep **]** key on the front panel or clicking the [Sweep] function area on the screen will display a pop-up Sweep Configuration Dialog as shown in Fig.2.28. To select the frequency generation mode as Step, List or Ramp, click the corresponding option at the top of the dialog and display a pop-up Step/List/ Ramp Sweep Config Dialog as shown in Fig.2.29, 2.30 and 2.31. Users can edit and set the Freq Start and stop, sweep points, dwell time, etc. Additionally, when manual sweep is activated, the operation is irrelevant to whether the step/list/ramp sweep mode is selected.

Settings in this part include: Frequency generation mode, detailed configuration of step sweep, detailed configuration of list sweep, detailed configuration of ramp sweep, sweep mode [single/continuous], start sweep trigger, manual sweep, etc.

2.3.3.4 Simulation modulation

The instrument supports basic simulation modulation including amplitude modulation (AM), frequency modulation (FM) and phase modulation (PM). The instrument also allows pulse modulation to be enabled by using internal or external signal through digital and analog switches. Pressing the **[**AM**]**, **[**FM/ Φ M**]** and **[**Pulse **]** keys on the front panel or clicking [Amplitude Modulation], [Frequency Modulation], [Phase Modulation] in the [Simulation Modulation] function area and the [Pulse] function area on the screen will display the pop-up Amplitude Modulation, Frequency Modulation, Phase Modulation Modulation Modulation dialogs, respectively, as shown in Fig.2.32, 2.33, 2.34 and 2.35. The instrument provides standard internal waveforms including sinc, dualsinc, sweepsinc, triangle, zigzag, square and noise. Settings in Pulse Modulation Configuration Dialog include: Pulse modulation switch, source, width, period, PRF, delay, input reversed phase [ON/OFF], etc.

The instrument can output real-time baseband signals. Pressing the 【Base】 key on the front panel or clicking the [Base] function area on the screen will display a pop-up configuration dialog as shown in Fig.2.36. Customizing the real-time baseband can generate single carrier, implement real-time data modulation and control all parameters of digital modulation signals in real time. The characteristics of vector-modulated signals can be changed by using various data codes, filter, code rate, modulation type and trigger style. The data source and modulation type supported by baseband are as shown in Fig.2.37 and 2.38. The settings in real-time baseband menu includes: Baseband ON/OFF, data source, symbol rate, filter factor, filter select, etc.

2.3.3.6 System

The System Configuration Dialog is used for setting basic functions of the instrument. Pressing the [System] key on the front panel or clicking the [System] function area on the screen will display a pop-up System Configuration Dialog (Fig.2.39) which includes Base Config, GPIB Port, LAN Port, Instrument Self Test, Manual Test, etc.




Fig.3.39 System Configuration Dialog



2.4 Data management

This Section introduces the methods for saving/loading of working state, file management, and printing/saving of screenshot of the S1465 series signal generator.

2.4.1.1 Reset state of instrument

The S1465 series signal generator provides the user with the option of power-on reset state (Factory, User and Last State) as the initial state of start-up configuration. In case of an instrument configuration error, the initial state of instrument during normal operation usually can be recovered by resetting the instrument state. The settings of reset state of the signal generator are as follows:

Step 1. Activate the system configuration window:

Press **[** System **]** key or tap [System] on the touchscreen to pop up the system configuration window on the user interface, and select [Reset] option, as shown in Fig.2.40.

Step 2. Set the reset option:

Turn RPG clockwise (or anticlockwise), select [Reset] combo box, press the knob to activate the option, and press the Up and Down keys, or switch among the options of Factory | User | Last State on the touchscreen to select the reset state of the signal generator.

Select "Factory": Press 【Reset】 key or restart the instrument, and then the instrument enters the factory default state;

Select "User" and press the "Save User State" key: The instrument automatically saves the current configuration. Press [Reset] key or restart the instrument, and then the instrument is initialized to the setting state previously saved by the user.

Select "Last State": Press [Reset] key or restart the instrument, and then the instrument enters the state automatically saved before the shutdown last time.

2.4.1.2 Saving/loading of user state

The S1465 series signal generator provides the function of saving/loading the instrument setting state, which facilitates the user to recover the saved setting state, reduce the complexity of operation, and observe, evaluate and save the required measurement data again. See "4.2.12 Saving/loading" in "4.2 Menu Description" for specific setting parameters.

Step 1.: Open the saving/loading configuration window:


Press [Save] key to pop up the saving/loading configuration window on the user interface, as shown in Fig.2.41.

Step 2. Set saving/loading file number:

Turn RPG clockwise (or anticlockwise) or select "Saving/Loading File No." input box on the touchscreen, and press the knob to enable the input box in an editing state. Input numbers in the range of 0-99, and complete it by pressing Enter on the front panel. After saving, it's required to wait for a few seconds to complete the saving process; after loading, it's required to wait for more than ten seconds so that the signal generator can reset the hardware and software settings according to the selected instrument state.

2.4.2 File management

The S1465 series signal generator has file management function, providing: File input/output function, file browsing, and copying, cutting, pasting and deleting operations of directory (files). Data files can be accessed through front panel keys, touch screen, mouse or remote control (see Programming Manual of the S1465 series signal generator for details).

All factory data files in D:\S1465data\ sys\ directory cannot be moved, deleted and renamed by the user. Otherwise, the factory will not be responsible for any serious consequence caused by output errors of the instrument. If the user deletes any one by mistake, either system recovery or recalibration in the factory can be conducted.

All user data files in D:\S1465data\user\ directory can be operated by the user with caution, and note that the data saved by the user cannot be recovered anymore after being deleted by mistake.

2.4.2.2 File input/output method

The S1465 series signal generator provides data file input/output function. File input refers to opening the selected data file and refreshing the parameter display of controls (including list, etc.), for ease of observation and evaluation; while file output refers to storing the configuration data in the file in the agreed format (such as ASCII, *.dat). The signal generator provides input/output of debugging information files. The user only needs to enter the corresponding menu to pop up the dialog box and select the dialog box key or menu item to perform the file operations.

The S1465 series signal generator has the instrument debugging function. This function is only open to the factory for maintenance instead of users. Important debugging data includes: Amplitude flatness data, I/Q modulation calibration data and reference frequency response calibration data. Relevant information files can be loaded to display the parameter component information in a list for ease of observation, and these debugging data can also be stored in default files.

2.4.2.3 File format description

The file formats stored in the signal generator are described here to help users to analyze configuration data. There are two types of these file formats: Direct storage and storage of additional file header information.

1) Direct storage

During storage of such files, the configuration result data structure can be directly stored in the files (*.dat), such as the instrument debugging information. Such files are poorly readable after being directly opened and are not used as a means for reference analysis by users. They are usually recovered to the controls for viewing through the file input/output function.

2) Storage of additional file header information

According to design requirements, some files need additional file headers, which occupy 256 Bytes and are used for storing associated parameter information. For example: For any random waveform segment data file, the associated parameter information is firstly stored in the agreed format, such as symbol length, sampling clock, factory identification and other information, and then the waveform data is stored. Relevant user files involved with additional file header information are listed in the following table (Table 2.9):

2.4.3 Printing/saving of screenshot

The S1465 series signal generator provides the functions of saving screenshots in graph files (bmp or jpg) and printing screenshots

2.4.3.1 Saving screenshots (in file) Operation steps:

Step 1. If the signal generator is not connected to a printer, press [Print] key on the front panel to pop up "Save as" dialog box, enter the name (*.bmp) of the screenshot graph file, and click "Save" to complete this operation.

3 Operation Guides

3.1 Basic operation guides

This section describes the operation of different configuration functions of S1465 series vector signal generator, including: modulation, sweep, etc. The configuration steps are detailed by examples.

3.1.1 Digital modulation

The signal generator has the function of configuring real-time digital modulation signal output.

Example: The signal generated is real-time baseband signal with data source of PN9, modulation format of QPSK and symbol rate of 4Msps.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Open Baseband Config Dialog:

Press the [Base] key or tap [Base] button on the touchscreen to open the Baseband Config Dialog (Fig.3.1).

Step 2.Select the data source:

Select [Base Config] in the Baseband Config Dialog, rotate the RPG clockwise (or counterclockwise) to move to Data Source selection combo box, and click the button to display the available data source options; or tap Data Source on the touchscreen to display the available data source options. The data source options available include: [PN Serial], [Fix 4], [Equal 10] and [File], select [PN 9] option under the [PN Serial].

Step 3. Select the modulation type:

Select [Module Type] in the Baseband Config Dialog to display the current type of modulation, select the modulation type QPSK, or tap [PSK/OQPSK] under [Modulation Type] on the touchscreen, then tap [QPSK/OQPSK] under [PSK] option, and finally tap [QPSK] under [QPSK/OQPSK] option.

Step 4. Setting the symbol rate:

Select [Base Config] in the Baseband Config Dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select the symbol rate input box and press the knob, or tap [Symbo Rate] on the touchscreen to make the input box editable. Input 4 Msps and finish.

Step 5. Select the filter type:

Select [Filter] in the Baseband Config Dialog, rotate the RPG clockwise (or counterclockwise) to move to Filter Select combo box, and press the knob to select "Root Nyquist"; or tap [Filter] on the touchscreen to display the available filter options and tap [Root Nyquist].

Step 6. Switch on the baseband:

After configuring baseband parameters, select [Base Config] in the Baseband Config Dialog, rotate the RPG on front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select Base Band switch, press the knob to open the baseband, or tap [Base Band] on the touchscreen to activate the baseband output.

Instructions for Fix 4 and filters

If the data source is selected as Fix4, Fix4 Data is required, of which the range is 0000 (binary) - 1111 (binary), displayed and input (0-15) by decimal notation in the configuration dialog.

If the modulation type is selected as FSK (2FSK, 4FSK, 8FSK, 16FSK) or MSK, the filter shall be selected as Gauss in order to achieve better output.

3.1.2 Simulation modulation and pulse modulation

3.1.2.1 Amplitude modulation(AM)

Please refer to the 2.3.2.2 Modulated signals of 2 Start Guide.

3.1.2.2 Frequency modulation(FM)

Example: To generate FM signals with LO frequency of 3.5GHz, amplitude of 0dBm, modulation rate of 0.001MHz and FM offset of 1MHz.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Set RF output signal:

Set CW to 3.5GHz, power level to 0dBm and 【RF ON/OFF】 to ON.

Step 2. Open FM Config Dialog:

Press [$FM/\Phi M$] key or tap [Frequency Modulation] under [Simulation Modulation] on the touchscreen, and the FM Config Dialog pops up in the operation interface (Fig.3.2). Or select [MOD ON/OFF] key to open the modulation configuration dialog and switch to the FM Config Dialog.

Step 3. Set FM waveform:

Select [FM Config] in the frequency modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select FM Waveform combo box, press the knob to activate the option, and press Up/Down button to select [Sinc]; or tap FM Waveform combo box on the touchscreen to select [Sinc] option.

Step 4. Set FM source:

Select [FM Source] in the FM Config Dialog rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) and press the knob to select [INT], or tap [INT] under the [FM Source] on the touchscreen.



Step 5. Set modulation rate:

Select [FM Config] in the frequency modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select FM Rate input box and press the knob or tap FM Rate input box on the touchscreen to make the input box editable. Input 0.001MHz and end.

Step 6. Set FM deviation:

Rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select FM Dev input box and press the knob to make the input box editable. Input 1MHz and end.

Step 7. RF ON:

Press 【 RF ON/OFF 】 to turn on RF output. The RF ON/OFF state displayed on the operation interface is "RF ON".

Step 8. Turn on FM output:

Select [FM Config] in the frequency modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [FM ON/OFF] and press the knob to switch on FM or tap [FM ON/OFF] on the touchscreen and turn on FM output. The modulation section in the main information screen **FMs** plays

, which indicates the FM has been started and the signal generator is outputting FM signals via the RF output connector.

3.1.2.3 Phase modulation (PM)

Example: To generate PM signals with LO frequency of 3.5GHz, amplitude of 0dBm, modulation rate of 0.001MHz and phase bias of 1rad.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Set RF output signal:

3.5GHz CW (continuous wave) with a amplitude level of 0dBm, [RF ON/OFF] in ON.

Step 2. Open PM Config Dialog:

Press **[**FM/ΦM**]** key or tap [Phase Modulation] under [Simulation Modulation] on the touchscreen, and the PM Config Dialog pop-ups in the operation interface (Fig.3.3). Or select **b**pen the modulation configuration dialog and switch to the PM Config Dialog.

Step 3. Set the PM waveform:



Select [PM Config] in the phase modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select PM Waveform combo box, press the knob to activate the option, and press Up/Down button to select [Sinc],or tap PM Waveform combo box on the touchscreen and select [Sinc] option.

Step 4. Set the PM source:

Select [PM Source] in the phase modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) and press the knob to select [INT], or tap [INT] under the [PM Source] on the touchscreen.

Step 5. Set the PM bandwidth:

Select [PM Config] in the phase modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) and press the knob to select [Normal], or tap [Normal] of PM Bandwidth on the touchscreen.

Step 6. Set the modulation rate:

Select [PM Config] in the phase modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select the PM Rate input box and press the knob or tap PM Rate input box on the touchscreen to make the input box editable. Input 0.001MHz and end.

Step 7. Set the PM bias:

Select [PM Config] in the phase modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select PM Bias input box and press the knob or tap PM Bias input box on the touchscreen to make the input box editable. Input 1 (default unit: rad) and press Enter key on the front panel to finish this.

Step 8. RF ON:

Press 【 RF ON/OFF 】 key or tap [RF ON/OFF] on the touchscreen to turn on RF output. The RF ON/OFF state displayed on the operation interface is "RF ON".

Step 9. Turn on PM output:

Select [PM Config] in the phase modulation dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [PM ON/OFF] and press the knob to switch on PM or tap [PM ON/OFF] on the touchscreen and turn on PM output.

When the simulation modulation is turned on, the signal flow diagram will be display in the instrument status configuration section while the associated modulation mode is shown in the main information display.

3.1.3 Sweep

The sweep function is one of many important functions of a signal generator, and S1465 Series Signal Generator mainly provides step sweep, list sweep and ramp sweep modes.

3.1.3.1 Step sweep

Example: Output: step sweep signal; start frequency: 1GHz, stop frequency: 10GHz; step counts: 10; step dwell time: 10ms; step trigger mode: automatic; step type: linear.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Open Sweep Config Dialog:

Press [Sweep] key or tap [Sweep] on the touchscreen to open the Sweep Config Dialog (Fig.3.4).

Select [Step Sweep].

Select [Sweep] mode, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [Current Sweep Type], press the knob, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [Step Sweep] to turn on the step sweep mode; or tap [Step Sweep] under [Current Sweep Type] on the touchscreen to activate the step sweep mode. Now, the instrument performs step sweep automatically with currently configured parameters.



Step 3. Configure step sweep parameters:

Select [Step Sweep] in the Sweep Config Dialog, as shown in Fig.3.5, and then make the following settings: Freq Start: 1GHz, Freq Stop: 10GHz; Step Counts: 10; Step Dwell: 10ms; Step Trig: Auto; Step Type: Linear.

After all settings are completed, press key or press [Back] key repeatedly to close the current dialog.

After the step sweep is activated, the start frequency, stop frequency will be shown in the main information display of the operation interface.

3.1.3.2 List sweep

Example: Output: list sweep signal; list sweep counts: 10, Count 1 is 1GHz, Count 2 is 2GHz in incrementing order; amplitude offset at each point: 0.00dBm; dwell time: 10ms; list trigger mode: automatic; sweep indirection: forward.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Open Sweep Config Dialog:

Press [Sweep] key or tap [Sweep] on the touchscreen to open the Sweep Config Dialog (Fig.3.4).

Step 2. Open List Sweep configuration dialog:

Select [List Sweep].

Select [Sweep Mode] in the Sweep Config Dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [Current Sweep Type], press the knob, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [List Sweep] to turn on the LIST sweep mode; or tap [List Sweep] under [Current Sweep Type] on the touchscreen to activate the list sweep mode. Now, the instrument performs list sweep automatically with currently configured parameters.

Step 3. Configure list sweep parameters:

Select [List Sweep] in the Sweep Config Dialog, as shown in Fig.3.6. In the List Sweep configuration dialog, two methods for configuration are available.

Method 1: Manually inserting counts.

Rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [Edit List], press the knob to select Insert Counts, and rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select the parameter to be set and make it editable; or tap the parameter to be set under [Edit List] on the touchscreen make it editable.



The list sweep parameters include: CW rate at current frequency, offset and dwell time. Insert counts continuously until the sweep list is completed.

Method 2: Auto fill.

Rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select Freq Start input box, press the knob to make the box editable and input 1GHz; set Freq Stop to be 10GHz and Insert Counts to be 10 in the same way; rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [Auto Fill], press the knob to automatically fill the sweep list; or tap Freq Start input box on the touchscreen to make the box editable and input 1GHz and set Freq Stop to be 10GHz and Insert Counts to be 10 in the same way, and then tap [Auto Fill].

Set All List Ampl Offset as 0dBm, All List Dwell Time as 10ms, List Trig as Auto and Sweep Indirection as Forward.

After automatic filling, parameters can also be edited manually in Edit List.

After all settings are completed, press key or press [Back] key repeatedly to close the current dialog.

Step 4. Display the instrument status:

After the list sweep is activated, the main information display of the operation interface will show: minimum frequency, maximum frequency, etc.

3.1.3.3 Ramp sweep

Example: Output: ramp sweep signal; start frequency:1GHz, stop frequency: 10GHz; sweep time setting: automatic.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Open Sweep Config Dialog:

Press [Sweep] key or tap [Sweep] on the touchscreen to open the Sweep Config Dialog (Fig.3.4).

Step 2. Open Ramp Sweep configuration dialog:

Select [Ramp Sweep].

Select [Sweep Mode] in the Sweep Config Dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [Current Sweep Type], press the knob, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select [Ramp Sweep] to turn on the LIST sweep mode; or tap [Ramp Sweep] under [Current Sweep Type] on the touchscreen to activate the list ramp mode. Now, the instrument performs ramp sweep automatically with currently configured parameters.

Step 3. Configure ramp sweep parameters:




Fig.3.7 Ramp Sweep configuration dialog

Select [Ramp Sweep] in the in the Sweep Config Dialog, as shown in Fig.3.7, and in the Ramp sweep



configuration dialog, make the following settings: Freq Start: 1GHz, Freq Stop: 10GHz; Sweep Dwell Time Type: Auto.

After all settings are completed, press key or press Back key repeatedly to close the current dialog.

Step 4. Display the instrument status:

After the ramp sweep is activated, the main information display of the operation interface will show: minimum frequency, maximum frequency, etc.

NOTE

Return from sweep status to CW state

To return the instrument from sweep state to CW state, set [Current Sweep Type] in the Sweep Config Dialog to CW.

3.2 Advanced operation guides

This section describes the relatively complicated configuration process of series S1465 signal generator.

3.2.1 Configuring multi-tone

The signal generator supports configuration of dual-tone and multi-tone signal outputs.

Example: The generator can generates multi-tone (6 tones) signals with frequency interval of 10MHz and attenuation of 0dB at each tone.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Open Dual Tone/Multi Tone configuration dialog:

Tap [Multi Tone] under [Dual Tone/Multi Tone] on the touchscreen, and the Multi Tone Config Dialog pops up (Fig.3.8).

Step 2. Set the number of tones:

Select [Base Config] in the Multi Tone Config Dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select Tone Count input box and press the knob or tap Tone Count input box on the touchscreen to make the box editable. Input 6 and press Enter on the front panel to automatically add 6 tones to the multi-tone list.



Step 3. Set the frequency interval

Select [Base Config] in the Multi Tone Config Dialog, rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select the Freq Interval input box and press the knob or tap Freq Interval input box on the touchscreen to make the box editable. Input 10 and press Enter key on the front panel to finish this. Freq Offset will be automatically changed in the multi-tone list. Currently, the 2-64 tones can be set and the frequency interval shall not exceed 200MHz.

Step 4. Turn on multi-tone output

After configuring multi-tone parameters, rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select Multi Tone ON/OFF, and press the knob to turn ON the multi-tone; or tap Multi Tone ON/OFF on the touchscreen to activate the multi-tone. The modulation section in the main information screen displays IQ M-T

NOTE

Atten Ampl and Phase in multi-tone list

Atten Ampl in multi-tone list refers to attenuation value of tone amplitude, and each tone can have a different attenuation value ranging from -100 dB to 0 dB. Currently, the hardware system can measure the attenuation up to -40dB.

Phase refers to the initial phase of each tone, and can be set as a random or fixed value.

NOTE

Multi-tone and dual-tone modulations are incompatible

Multi-tone and dual-tone modulations are incompatible. When a modulation mode is turned on, the other one will be automatically turned off.



3.2.2 ARB configuration

The arbitrary waveform function is available in two modes: sequence and arbitrary waveform. The S1465 Series Signal Generator supports sequence and arbitrary waveform playback functions.

In the sequence mode, you can generate waveform segment files as needed, and play the waveform segments arbitrarily. In arbitrary waveform mode, you can load arbitrary waveform data files in the custom format for playback.

Example 1: Generate a Wave Segment file example.seg with the Data Source of PN9, the Modulation Type of QPSK, the Sample Counts of 40000 and the Samp Clock of 4 MHz, and set the markers for the start and end of the Wave Segment file.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Activate the Arb Seq Config Dialog:

Press 【ARB】 to pop up the Arb Seq Config Dialog on the operation interface (Fig.3.9).

Rotate the RPG clockwise (or counterclockwise), move the focus to the "Work Pattern" combo box, press the knob to select "Seq"; or touch the "Work Pattern" option box on the screen to set the Work Pattern to Seq.

Step 3. Custom Wave Segment:

Select the "Custom Wav Seg" button and pop up the "Custom Wav Seg" dialog (Fig.3.10)

Step 4. Set the Wave Segment name:

Before generating a Wave Segment, you shall first set the name of the Wave Segment to be generated. Select the "Output File Name" button, pop up the "Save As" dialog, enter the name (example) of the Wave Segment to be generated in the dialog with the file suffix of seg. The Wave Segment file is automatically saved in the folder wav. Close the dialog and return to the Custom Wav Seg Dialog. Follow the steps below to continue setting the parameters of the Wave Segment.




Fig.3.11 Wave Segment Output File "Save As" Dialog

Step 5. Set the Wave Segment filtering parameters:



A Wave Segment file with sample counts of 40,000 is to be generated according to the formula: Sample Counts = Length of Wave Segment (Symbol) × Over Sample Count, where the Over Sample Count is the number of interpolations of each symbol at the time of shaping filtering. The software automatically calculates the Over Sample Count by default, whose maximum is 32; in the current model 1465, each sampling point occupies 4 bytes (I channel data occupies 16 bits and Q channel data occupies 16 bits), and the maximumstorage capacity of the baseband board is 4GByte (8GByte option), so the maximum sample counts is 1GSample (2GSample option).

The software automatically limits the length of the input symbol and the value of the Over Sample Count based on the current baseband storage capacity. It takes a long time to generate a Wave Segment if the Over Sample Count is big. It is recommended to turn off automatic counting of the Over Sample Count and set the Over Sample Count to 4.

In this example, the sample counts to be generated is 40000, the Over Sample Count is set to 4, and the length of the Wave Segment (symbol) is set to 10000. The Samp Clock of the Wave Segment to be generated is 4 MHz and Samp Clock = Over Sample Count × Symbol Rate; the symbol rate is set to 4 Msps.

Step 6. Select the Data Source:

Rotate the RPG clockwise (or counterclockwise), move the focus to the "Data Source" combo box, and press the knob to select PN9. Or touch the "Data Source" option box on the screen to select PN9.

Step 7. Set the Wave Segment modulation parameters:

The Modulation Type combo box displays the currently selected modulation type.Select the Modulation Type QPSK; or touch the "Modulation Type" combo box on the screen to successively select [PSK]—>[QPSK/OQPSK]—>[QPSK]. Select the default filter.

Step 8. Set the Wave Segment marker:

Select the "Edit Marker" button to open the Edit Marker dialog (Fig.3.12). In this dialog the user can edit 4 independent markers.

The coordinate system length of the Edit Marker dialog box is 40000, the Sample Counts edited previously. Select the marker with the mouse, double-click the left button at the specified index, and set the output of the marker when the marker line is High or set no output of the marker when the marker line is Low.

The example requires setting the markers at the start and end of the Wave Segment. Put the mouse at the start of the marker 1 and double click the left button to set the marker line to High when the current index is displayed as 0. Put the mouse at the index 100 and double click the left button to set the marker line to Low. At this time, it is High from indexes 0 to 100 and it is Low from indexes 100 to 40000. Similarly, the marker line is set to High between indexes 39900 and 40000.

For easy selection of the marker index, the user can modify the value of the "Amplification Range" item and then select the "Amplification" option. The coordinate scale is displayed with the current index as a center based on the value of the Amplification Range after modification. Thus, during the playback of the Wave Segment, the marker 1 port outputs a high level when the sampling points from 0 to 100 and from 39900 to 40000 are played. After the editing, click the "Generate Marker File" button to generate example.mrk marker file in the wav folder and in the same directory as the Wave Segment.

NOTE

Instructions for use of markers:

- When the user does not select the output file name of the Wave Segment, the "Generate Marker File" button in the Marker Edit dialog is ineffective. A marker file with the same name as the Wave Segment can be generated only if the name of the Wave Segment file is set.
- > The output ends of the Markers 1, 2, 3, and 4 are SMA plugs on the rear panel.
- In the Marker Edit dialog, the user can save the edited marker to the file name specified by the user through the 'Save Edited Graphics' button and call the last edited marker file through the "Open Edited Graphics" button. The default saving directory is the Marker folder.
- > To make the edited marker valid, set the marker of the Wave Segment to On in the Seq list.

Step 9. Generate the Wave Segment:

Close the Marker Edit dialog box, return to the "Custom Wave Segment" dialog box, and select the "Generate Wave Segment" button, to generate the Wave Segment.

Example 2: Sequence playback function: to demonstrate flexible functions of sequence editing and playbacks.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Set the frequency:

> Edit frequency and amplitude and turn on RF.

Set the frequency as 10GHz and amplitude as 0dBm, and turn on RF.

Step 2. Activate the Arb Seq Config Dialog:

> Open the Arb Config Dialog.

Tab [Arb] under the [Signal] on the touchscreen, and the Arb Config Dialog pops up (Fig.3.9).

Step 3. Set the Parameters



Set the Work Pattern: Seq.

Rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select "Work Pattern", press the knob to set Work Pattern as Seq (sequence); or tap "Work Pattern" on the touchscreen and set Work Pattern as Seq.

Set the Clock Type: Invariant.

Rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select "Clock Type", press the knob to set Clock Type as Invariant; or tap "Work Pattern" on the touchscreen to set Clock Type as Invariant.

This clock type indicates: The baseband plays each waveform segment at variable sampling rate, and these two waveform segments in the sequence are played according to its default clock frequency.

Step 4. Add waveform segments

> Add waveform segments as needed.

Rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) or tap "Add Wave Seg" on the touchscreen and select the sample wave segment file 400KSin_16MClk.seg in the dialog to add it into the sequence list; select "Add Wave Seg" again to add the sample file 400KTri_16MClk.seg into the sequence list.

NOTE

Instructions for sample wave segment file

- The sample wave segment file 400KSin_16MClk has a baseband output of sine wave (clock frequency: 16MHz, playback duration: 25ms). The sine wave output can be seen by connecting l-channel output (or Q-channel output) on the rear panel of the instrument to an oscilloscope.
- The sample wave segment file 400KTri_16MClk has a baseband output of triangle wave (clock frequency: 16MHz, playback duration: 25ms). The triangle wave output can be seen by connecting I-channel output (or Q-channel output) on the rear panel of the instrument to an oscilloscope.

Step 5. Turn on the arbitrary waveform function

Select "Arb Seq ON".

After configuring the arbitrary waveform sequence, rotate the knob on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select Arb Seq ON/OFF, press the knob to turn ON the Arb Seq; or tap Arb Seq ON/OFF on the touchscreen to activate Arb Seq. Now, the instrument downloads the playback sequence automatically.

The associated sequence playback sample is shown in Table 3.1:

It shall be noted that the playback at variable sampling rate is implemented by software through automatic interpolation, and at the hardware end, the playback will be done at fixed sampling rate.

Example 3: Arbitrary waveform playback function

Operation steps:

Step 1. Set the frequency:

> Edit frequency and amplitude and turn on RF.

Set the frequency as 10GHz and amplitude as 0dBm, and turn on RF.

Step 2. Activate the Arb Seq Config Dialog:

> Open the Arb Config Dialog.

Tap [Arb] under the [Signal] on the touchscreen, and the Arb Config Dialog pops up (Fig.3.9).

Step 3. Set the parameters

Set the Work Pattern: Arb.

Rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select the "Arb Seq" option box, press the knob to turn ON the Arb Seq; or tap "Arb Seq" on the touchscreen to activate Arb Seq.

Set the clock frequency: 100MHz.

Rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select "Clock Freq" input box, and press the knob to make it editable; or tap "Clock Freq" on the touchscreen to make it editable.

Step 4. Add arbitrary waveform files

Load arbitrary waveform as needed.

Select "Load Arb" and select the file type Mat-File in the popup dialog; select the sample file 1MSin.mat to add it into the list.



Step 5. Select the file format

> Press "File Format Config" and set the type as the matrix list data.

Rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) or tap File Format Config on the touchscreen to automatically read the matrix list in the current mat file. Select Idata_Int16 in the dropdown list of I matrix, Qdata_Int16 in the dropdown list of Q matrix and MarkerData_int8 in the dropdown list of Marker matrix. Select the default data type. Close the File Format Config dialog box and return to the Arb Seq configuration dialog.

Step 6. Set the markers

Set Markers 1 to 4 in the list as ON. Step 7. Turn on the arbitrary wavefor function

Select "Arb Seq ON".

The instrument will automatically download and play the arbitrary waveform files. The triangle wave output can be seen by connecting I-channel output (or Q-channel output) on the rear panel of the instrument to an oscilloscope. The edited marker output can be observed on an oscilloscope by connecting it to Markers 1-2 outputs on the rear panel.

NOTE

Support user-defined arbitrary waveform file formats

The signal generator supports the playback of user-defined arbitrary waveform files.

It currently supports conversion of the following file formats: Mat-File 5, ASCII, Binary, cap, and csv. The generator can convert data files in the above 5 formats to the waveform data file .seg (16-bit data) and marker file .mrk it uses to play.

3.2.3 Selecting ALC bandwidth

In the internal level control mode, the signal generator will use the automatic level control (ALC) circuit before the RF output.

There are five ALC bandwidth options: Auto, 100Hz, 1kHz, 10kHz and 100kHz.

In Auto mode (reset option), the signal generator automatically selects ALC bandwidth according to the configuration and settings; when the frequency is less than 1MHz or the vector modulation is turned on, the bandwidth is 100Hz; when the frequency is greater than 1MHz but less than 10MHz, the bandwidth is 1kHz; when the frequency is greater than 10MHz with AM turned on and pulse modulation turned off, the bandwidth is 100kHz; in other cases the bandwidth is 10kHz. In other modes than Auto, the ALC bandwidth will be set according to user's choice.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Turn on the ALC bandwidth

Press the 【Amplitude】 key or tap [Amplitude] on the touchscreen to select [ALC Band] in the Ampl Config Dialog and then select "ALC Band Manu";

Step 2. Select the bandwidth

Bandwidth options: 100Hz, 1kHz, 10kHz, 100kHz, selected as needed;

Limited bandwidth or narrow bandwidth will extend the time of ALC sampling and thus indicate the RMS value of signal in a more accurate way.



3.2.4 External level control

3.2.4.1 Introduction

In level control regulation mode, the generator's output amplitude will be detected by external probes, the detected voltage will be sent back to the generator's level control circuit and the output amplitude will be automatically corrected to keep the amplitude constant at detection points.

3.4.4.2 Level control using detector/coupler/power divider

1) Block Diagram of Measurement




Fig.3.10 Wiring Diagram of ALC Circuit for External Level Control Measurement

A typical setup of external level control is shown in Fig.3.10. In external level control mode, the amplitude level will be fed back by the negative voltage output detector rather than the internal detector. The fed-back voltage controls the ALC system and thus the output amplitude.

2) Measurement steps

Step 1. Set the external level control:

- 1) Connect the instrument as shown in Fig.3.10;
- 2) Press the [Amplitude] key or tap [Level Control] under the [Amplitude] on the touchscreen;
- 3) Select the "Level Control" as: EXT.

Step 2. Set the coupling parameters

Edit the option Ext Detector Couple and input 20dB (this is the coupling factor of the directional coupler).

NOTE

The coupling factor of the power divider is 0dB.

3.2.5 Working with a frequency mixer/ Effects of reverse power




Fig.3.11 Effects of Reverse Power (-8dBm Coupling Output)

"The attenuator can be manually used for frequency mixer testing. In the example shown in Fig. 3.11, the signal generator has an output amplitude of -8dBm and in the internal amplitude modulation mode, the attenuation of attenuator is set to 0dB. The amplitude level of ALC is set to -8dBm. The frequency mixer is driven with an LO of +10 dBm and has an LO–to–RF (of the generator) isolation of 15 dB. The resulting -5dBm LO feedthrough amplitude enters the signal generator's RF output and arrives at the internal detector via the attenuator without loss.

Depending on frequency, it is possible for most of this LO feedthrough energy to enter the detector. Because the detector will respond to its input amplitude regardless of frequency, this energy causes the ALC to reduce the output amplitude. In this example, the reverse power across the detector is actually greater than the ALC level, therefore the amplitude output of the generator is actually shut down.




Fig.3.12 Effects of Reverse Power (-8dBm Non-coupling Output)

In the example shown in Fig.3.12, a -8dBm amplitude output is manually generated with the attenuator. In this example, the attenuation is 10dB, the ALC level is +2dBm and the LO frequency of frequency mixer is 10dBm. With the 10dB attenuator, the reverse power (-5dBm) of LO is attenuated to

-15dBm, thus the detector is exposed to a +2dBm ALC level and the undesired -15dBm reverse power. This 17dB difference results in a 0.1dB shift in the signal generator's output level. Set the generator manually with an attenuator:

Operation steps:

Step 1. Open the Ampl Config Dialog

Press the [Amplitude] key or tap [Amplitude] on the touchscreen to open Ampl Config Dialog.

Step 2. Set Attenuation Style in ALC system to Manual and set the attenuation value.

Select [Atten Config] in the Ampl Config Dialog, rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select Attenuation Style box, and press the knob to select Manual; rotate RPG again to select Attenuation input box, and press the knob to make it editable; or tap Attenuation Style on the touchscreen to select Manual, and then tap Attenuation input box to make it editable. Then, set the Attenuation to 10 dB.

Step 3. Set ALC

Select [Atten Config] in the Ampl Config Dialog, rotate RPG on the front panel clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select ALC input box, and press the knob to make it editable; or tap ALC input box on the touchscreen to make it editable. Now, set ALC to 2dBm.

3.2.6 Creating and applying a user flatness correction array

The basic operations for creating flatness correction array is to implement correction by connecting the GPIB port to a power meter. The user flatness correction function is explained in the example below.

Example: Use a 2432 power meter to perform the automatic flatness correction of sweep signal from 4GHz to 7GHz. In this example, signals from 4GHz to 7GHz are corrected for flatness at interval of 1GHz and the signal generator control the 2432 power meter with an interface bus to generate the correction data array.

Operation steps:




Fig.3.13 User Flatness Correction

Step 1. Connect the instrument as shown in Fig.3.13.

Step 2. Set the power meter and zero it and probe.

Step 3. Set probe calibration parameters properly for the power meter. Step 4. Enable the

power meter/probe calibration parameter series.

See the manual of 2432 power meter for detailed methods of use.

Step 4. Enable the power meter/probe calibration parameter series.

Step 5. Connect the power probe to the amplitude output connector to be calibrated.

Step 6. Set the signal generator and press the [Reset] key. Set the amplitude level to 0dBm and



turn ON the [User Flatness ON/OFF].

Step 7. Press the 【Calibration】 key and select [User Flatness], the "User Calibration" dialog pops up.

Step 8. In the "User Calibration" dialog, select [Delete All Counts] to ensure all calibration data has been cleared.

Step 9. Input counts to be calibrated: Input counts at a step of 1GHz manually or generate counts automatically.

In the example, Auto Fill is used.

- 1) Select [Freq Start] under [Auto Fill] and input 4GHz;
- 2) Select [Freq Stop] and input 7GHz;
- 3) Select [Freq Step] and input 1GHz;
- 4) Select [Confirm Fill].

The frequency list will be automatically filled with: 4GHz (Freq Start), 7GHz (Freq Stop) and an increment of 1GHz; input calibration data, as shown in Fig.3.14.

Step 10. After all parameters have been set, start the calibration.

Ensure that the signal generator is connected to the power meter with a GPIB cable, select [GPIB Port] under [System] to set the GPIB address, programming language and power meter selection

Select [Calibrate All Counts] to start the calibration and the power meter is controlled by the signal generator to perform the count calibration continuously according to the calibration list. Calibrated data is automatically stored after calibration.

3.2.7 Selecting pulse modulation input

3.2.7.1 Selection of ALC status when pulse modulation is turned on

Limited to the tracking speed of generator's built-in ALC loop, the ALC loop should be set to open-loop or search mode when the pulse modulation is turned on and the pulse width is smaller than 1 μ s.

3.2.7.2 Selecting pulse input

1) Pulse input "Scalar"

Press the 【Pulse】 key or tap [Pulse] on the touchscreen, and Pulse Modu Config Dialog pops up; rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select "Source" option, press the knob to select [Scalar]; or tap "Source" on the touchscreen to select [Scalar].




Fig.3.15 Internal Scalar Pulse

Activate the pulse modulation and enable the internal pulse generator to generate 27.8kHz square wave (pulse width: 18µs, period: 36µs, as shown in Fig.3.15) with RF envelope rise and fall



times of about 0.2µs. This pulse is used for AC detection of scalar network analyzer.

2) Pulse input "Auto"

Press the 【Pulse】 key or tap [Pulse] on the touchscreen, and Pulse Modu Config Dialog pops up; rotate the knob clockwise (or counterclockwise) to select "Source" option, press the knob to select [Auto]; or tap "Source" on the touchscreen to select [Auto].




Fig.3.16 Internal Auto Mode

Set Pulse Modulation to ON and set the internal pulse generator as the pulse modulation source (Fig.3.16), which eliminates the need to connect external pulse signal. Also activate the auto trigger mode of internal pulse and do not sync with other trigger signal. You can set the pulse signal parameters in the Pulse Modu Config Dialog (Fig.2.22).

3) Pulse input "Trigger"




Fig.3.17 Internal Trigger Mode




Fig.3.18 Internal Gate Mode




Fig.3.19 D-Pulse Mode



Example 1: Real-time baseband mode. Data source: PN9, symbol rate: 4Mbps, modulation type: QPSK, trigger mode: single, trigger source: external, polarity: positive, delay: off.

Operation steps:

Step 1. Connect the instrument as shown in Fig.3.20.

Connect I/Q signal output on the rear panel to two input ports of a oscilloscope via the BNC cables, set another signal generator to the pulse modulation output mode and use it as the external trigger source (pulse width: 50µs, period: 200µs). Connect to "Monitor Output" of this signal generator to a BNC tee connector, of which one end is connected to "Code Pattern Trigger Input" of the vector signal generator and the other end is connected to the third input port of the oscilloscope.





Step 2. Press the 【 Base 】 key or tap [Base] on the touchscreen to open Baseband Config Dialog (Fig.3.1).

Step 3. Set parameters:

- 1) Set data source: PN9, symbol rate: 4Mbps, modulation type: QPSK;
- 2) Select [Trigger] to set the trigger style: Continue (single), Trigger Source: Ext, Ext Trig Polar: positive, delay: off;

Step 4. Set "Baseband" to ON.

Step 5. Observe those traces on the oscilloscope.




Fig.3.21 Diagram of Baseband Triggering (Continues/Single)

As shown in Fig.3.21: Signal 1: external trigger signal, Signal 2: I output, Signal 3: Q output. Each time the rising edge of pulse appears, the baseband signal is trigger for playback once. When the data source is PN9, it needs 60µs to play the 4Mbps baseband signal once; observe the testing results on the oscilloscope to verify if the function works properly.

Step 5. Observe those traces on the oscilloscope.

As shown in Fig.3.22: Signal 1: external trigger signal, Signal 2: I output, Signal 3: Q output. With an external pulse signal as the gate signal input, the baseband signal outputs at high level and will not output at low level.

- 1) Work pattern: Sequence, Add Wave Seg: 4KTri_2MClk (sine wave), Clock: customized 200MHz;

Step 4. Set "Arb Seq" to ON.

Step 5. Observe those traces on the oscilloscope.

time an external trigger signal arrives, the waveform segment starts to play; when next trigger signal arrives, the waveform segment responds in real time and starts to replay.




Fig.3.24 Diagram of Arbitrary Trigger (Continue/Realtime)




Fig.3.26 Diagram of Arbitrary Trigger (Single/Buffer Repeated Trig)




Fig.3.27 Diagram of Arbitrary Trigger (Single/Real-time Repeated Trig)




Fig.3.28 Diagram of Arbitrary Trigger (Wave Seg Single)

4 Menu

The menu of S1465 series signal generator includes: Frequency, Amplitude, Sweep, Modulation, Base, I/Q, System, File, Save/Recall, Print. As the number of soft keys on the front panel of the instrument is limited, the manufacturer sets the common function menu as boot menu by default, including: Frequency, Amplitude, Sweep, Modulation, Base, I/Q, RF ON/OFF. The menu of the signal generator is described below.


Fig.4.2 LF Out Dialog




Fig.4.49 CW Interferer Dialog



5 Remote Control

This chapter briefly introduces the remote control basis, remote interface and its configuration method and the basic VISA interface programming method of S1465 series signal generator, and also briefly describes the concept and classification of the I/O driver library, so that the user can have a preliminary knowledge about the remote control of this instrument. The specific content includes:

5.1 Remote Control Basis

5.1.1 Remote Interface

S1465 series signal generator supports four kinds of remote interfaces: LAN and GPIB, It is shown in the table below:

5.1.1.1 LAN interface

The signal generator is available for remote control via computer in 10Base-T and 100Base-T LAN, in which various instruments are integrated into a system and controlled by network computer. In order to realize the remote control within the LAN, the signal generator shall be preinstalled with the port connector, network card and relevant network protocol, and configured with relevant network service. And, the controller computer within the LAN shall also be preinstalled with the instrument control software and VISA library. The three working modes of the network card include:

- 10 Mbit/s Ethernet IEEE802.3;
- > 100 Mbit/s Ethernet IEEE802.3u;
- > 1 Gbit/s Ethernet IEEE802.3ab.

Control computer and signal generator need to be connected to a common TCP/IP protocol network via network interface. The cable between the computer and the signal generator is a commercial RJ45 cable (shielded or unshielded Category 5 twisted pair). During data transmission, data packet transmission will be adopted, and LAN transmission is faster. The cable length between



the computer and the signal generator shall generally not exceed 100 m (100Base-T and 10Base-T). For more information about LAN communication, refer to: http://www.ieee.org. The knowledge of LAN interface is introduced hereinafter.

1) IP address

When the signal generator is remotely controlled via LAN, the physical network connection shall be guaranteed to be smooth. The address of the signal generator is set to the subnet where the main control computer is located via menu "local IP". For example: If the IP address of main control computer is 192.168.12.0, the IP address of the signal generator shall be set to 192.168.12.XXX, where XXX is a value between 1 and 255.

Only the IP address is required to establish a network connection. The VISA addressing string is as follows:

TCPIP::host address[::LAN device name][::INSTR] or TCPIP::host address::port::SOCKET

Where,

TCPIP - network protocol used;

host address - IP address or host name of the instrument, for identification and control of the controlled instrument;

> The LAN device name defines the handle number of the protocol and sub-device (optional);

The VXI-11 protocol is adopted for the 0# equipment;

— The newer high speed LAN instrument protocol is adopted for the 0# high speed LAN instrument;

- The INSTR represents the instrument resource type (optional);
- > The port represents the socket port number;
- SOCKET is resource class of original network socket.

NOTE

Method for identification of multiple instruments in the remote control system

If multiple instruments are connected to the network, they can be identified by their individual IP address and associated resource string. The main control computer uses the respective VISA resource string for instrument identification.

2) VXI-11 protocol

The VXI-11 standard is based on the ONC RPC (Open Network Computing Remote Procedure Call) protocol, which is the network/transport layer of the TCP/IP protocol. TCP/IP network protocol and related network services are pre-configured. In communication, such connection-oriented communication follows sequential exchange and can identify the interruption of connection to ensure no information is lost.

3) Socket communication

TCP/IP protocol connects signal generator in the network through LAN socket. As a basic computer network programming method, the socket enables applications with different hardware and operating systems to communicate in the network, This method enables two-way communication between the signal generator and the computer via port.

The socket is a special software class that defines the necessary information for network communication such as IP address and device port number and integrates some basic network programming operations. Sockets can be used in the operating system installed with a packaged library. UNIX Berkeley socket and Winsock are commonly used.

The socket in the signal generator is compatible with Berkeley socket and Winsock through Application Program Interface (API). In addition, other standard sockets are also compatible through the API. When the signal generator is controlled using SCPI, the socket program created in the



program issues command. The socket port number of the signal generator must be set before LAN socket is used. For the signal generator, the socket port number is set to 5,000.

5.1.1.2 GPIB interface

The GPIB interface is a widely-used instrument remote interface currently, which can be connected with different kinds of instruments through the GPIB cable and can establish the test system with the main control computer. To realize remote control, the main control computer shall be preinstalled with the GPIB bus card, driver and VISA library. During communication, the main control computer will address the controlled instrument through the GPIB bus address firstly. The user can set the GPIB address and ID for querying strings, and the GPIB communication language can be set to the SCPI form by default.

The operation of the GPIB and its relevant interface is defined and described in details in the ANSI/IEEE standard 488.1-1987 and the ANSI/IEEE standard 488.2-1992. For details, refer to IEEE website: http://www.ieee.org.

As the GPIB processes information in bytes and the data transmission rate can reach 8 MBps, the GPIB data transmission is faster. The data transmission rate is limited by the distance between the device/system and the computer. When GPIB is connected, the following points shall be noted:

- > Up to 15 instruments may be set up through the GPIB interface;
- The total length of the transmission cable shall not exceed 15m, or shall not exceed twice of number of instruments in the system. The maximum length of transmission cable between equipment generally does not exceed 2 m.
- ▶ If you connect multiple instruments in parallel, you need to use "OR" connectors.
- The terminal of the IEC bus cable shall be connected with the instrument or the controller computer.

5.1.2 Message

Messages transmitted by data cable fall into the following two categories:

1) Interface message

During communication between the instrument and the main control computer, it is necessary to pull down the attention line and then the interface message can be transmitted to the instrument through the data line. Only the instrument with the GPIB bus functions can send the interface message.

2) Instrument message

For the structure and syntax of instrument message, refer to Section "6.1.3 SCPI". Instrument message can be divided into command and instrument response according to the different transmission directions. All remote interfaces use instrument message in the same method unless otherwise stated.

a) Commands:

A command (programming message) is a message transmitted from the main control computer to the instrument for remote control of instrument functions and query of status information. It falls into the following two categories:

Based on the impact on the instrument:

— Set command: change the instrument setup status, for example: reset or set the frequency.

— Query command: query and return data, for example: identify instrument or query parameter values. The query command is always ended with a question mark.

> Based on the definition in the standard:

— Common command: with functions and syntax defined in IEEE488.2, applicable to all types of instrument (if implemented) for management of standard status register, reset, self-test, etc.

— Instrument control command: Instrument characteristic command for instrument functions. For example: set the frequency.



The syntax also follows SCPI specification.

b) Instrument response:

The instrument response (response message and service request) is the query result information sent by the instrument to the computer. This information includes measurement result and instrument status.

5.1.3 SCPI

5.1.3.1 Brief introduction to SCPI

SCPI (Standard Commands for Programmable Instruments) is a set of commands established for all instruments based on IEEE488.2 mainly to achieve the universality of SCPI, i.e.the same SCPI is generated and issued for the same function.

The SCPI consists of a command header and one or more parameters which are separated by a space. The command header contains one or more key fields. The command with question mark as postfix is a query command. Commands are divided into common commands and instrument-specific commands that are different in syntactic structure. SCPI has the following features:

1) The SCPI is established for the test functions rather than instrument operation description.

2) The SCPI reduces the repetition of the realization process of similar test functions, thus ensuring the programming compatibility;

3) Remote control message is defined in a layer that is independent of the communication physical layer hardware.

4) The SCPI is irrelated with the programming methods and languages, and the SCPI test program is easy to be transplanted;

5) The SCPI is scalable so that it is applicable to measurement control on different scales.

Scalability makes SCPI a "Live"standard.

5.1.3.2 Description of SCPI

1) General terms

For the purpose of this section, the following terms should apply. It is necessary to know about the exact definitions of these terms for a better understanding of the content in various chapters.

Controller

The controller is any computer used to communicate with the SCPI equipment. The controller may be a personal computer, a small computer or a card inserted onto a cage. Some artificial intelligence equipment can also be used as a controller.

Equipment



The equipment is any device that supports SCPI. Most equipment is electronic measuring or excitation equipment and use the GPIB interface for communication.

Remote control message

The response message is a data set that specifies the SCPI format. It is always sent from the equipment to the controller or listener to remind the controller of the internal condition or measured value of the equipment.

Command

A command is an instruction in compliance with the SCPI standard. The combination of controller commands forms a message. In general, a command includes the keyword, parameter and punctuation.

Event command

An event-type SCPI can't be queried. An event command generally has no corresponding key settings on front panel. Its function is to trigger an event at a particular moment.

Query

Query is a special command. When the controller is queried, it is necessary to return to the response message in conformity with syntax requirement of the controller. The query statement is always ended with a question mark.

2) Command type

There are two types of SCPIs: common commands and instrument-specific commands. Fig.4.2 shows the difference between two commands. Common commands are defined in IEEE 488.2 to manage macros, status registers, synchronization, and data storage. Common commands are easy to recognize as they all begin with an asterisk. For example *IDN?, *OPC and *RST are common commands. Common commands don't belong to any instrument-specific command. The instrument uses the same method to interpret them without consideration to the current path setting.

It is very easy to identify instrument-specific commands because they contain a colon (:). Colons are used between the beginning of command expression and keywords, e.g.: FREQuency[:CW ?]. Instrument-specific commands are divided into command subsets of corresponding subsystem according to the functional block inside the instrument. For example, the power subsystem (:POWer) contains the power-related command while the status subsystem (:STATus) contains the command for the status control register.




Fig.5.1 SCPI Types

3) Instrument-specific command syntax

A typical command consists of keywords with colon as prefix.. These keywords are followed by parameters.. An example of syntax statement is shown below.

[:SOURce]:POWer[:LEVel] MAXimum|MINimum

In the above example, the [:LEVel] portion of the command immediately follows :POWer with no separating space. The portion following [:LEVel] is MINimum|MAXimum that is a parameter. There is a space between the command and the parameter. The description of other parts of the syntax expression is as shown in Table 5.2 and Table 5.3.

4) Command tree




Fig.5.2 Simplified Command Tree

Most remote control programming tasks involve instrument-specific commands. When such a command is parsed, the SCPI will use a structure similar to the file structure, and it is called as a command tree, as shown in Fig.5.2:

The top command is root command, or simply "root". In the case of command parsing, the command at the next layer is reached by following a specific route based on the tree structure. For example: :POWer:ALC:SOURce? where, POWer stands for AA,: ALC stands for BB, :SOURce stands for GG, and the whole command path is (:AA:BB:GG).

A software module in the instrument software—the command interpreter—is responsible for parsing each received SCPI. The command interpreter breaks up the command into individual command element using a series of rules for identifying the command tree path. After the current command is parsed, the current command path remains unchanged. In this way, the subsequent commands can be parsed more quickly and efficiently because the same command keyword may appear in different paths. After the power-on or *RST (reset) operation of the instrument, the current command path is reset as the root.

5) Command parameter and response

The SCPI defines different data formats in the use of the remote control and response messages to conform to the principles of "flexible listening" and "accurate speaking". For more information, please refer to IEEE 488.2. "Flexible Listening" means that the formats of commands and parameters are flexible.

For example, for the signal generator, the frequency offset state command is set as: FREQuency:OFFSet:STATe ON|OFF|1|0,

The following command formats are used to set the frequency offset function as "On":

:FREQuency:OFFSet:STATe ON, :FREQuency:OFFSet:STATe 1,

:FREQ:OFFS:STAT ON, :FREQ:OFFS:STAT 1

Each parameter type corresponding to one or more response data types. In the case of query, a numeric parameter will return a data type, and the response data is exact and strict, which is called "Accurate Speaking".

For example, if you query the power state (:POWer:ALC:STATe?), when it is turned on, the response is always 1, regardless of whether you previously sent: POWer:ALC:STATe 1 or :POWer:ALC:STATe ON.

Numeric parameter

Numeric parameters can be used in both instrument-specific commands and common commands. It receives all common decimal systems including signs, decimal point and scientific notation. If a certain piece of equipment only receives a specified type of numeric parameter such as an integer, it will automatically round off the received numeric parameter.

Examples of numeric parameter:

0no decimal point	
100	decimal point optional
1.23	with sign digit
4.56e <space>3</space>	space allowed after exponent marker e
-7.89E-01	exponent marker e may be upper or lower case
+256	leading + allowed
5	decimal point may be leading

Extended numeric parameter

Most measurements related to Instrument-specific commands use extended numeric parameters to specify the physical quantities. Extended numeric parameters receive all numeric parameters and additional special values. All extended numeric parameters receive MAXimum and MINimum as parameter values . Other special values, such as: UP and DOWN are received by the instrument parsing capability. SCPI table will list all valid parameters.

Note: Extended numeric parameters are not applicable to common commands or STATus subsystem commands.

Examples of extended numeric parameters:

101	Numeric parameter
1.2GHz	GHz may be used an exponent (E009)
200MHz	MHz may be used an exponent (E006)
-100mV	-100 millivolt
10DEG	10 degrees
MAXimum	maximum valid setting
MINimum	minimum valid setting
DOWN	decrease a step



Discrete parameter

When there are a finite number of parameter values to be set, discrete parameters are used for identification. A discrete parameter uses mnemonics to represent each valid setting. Like the SCPI mnemonics, the discrete parameter mnemonics can be set in long and short formats, with both capitalized and lowercase characters.

The following example illustrates the combined use of discrete parameter and command.

:TRIGger[:SEQuence]:SOURce BUS|IMMediate|EXTernal

BUS	GPIB,LAN,RS-232 triggered
IMMediate	Immediate trigger
EXTernal	External trigger

Boolean parameter

Boolean parameters represent a single binary condition that is either true or false. There are only four possible representations for a Boolean parameter.

Examples of Boolean parameters:

ON	Logical true
OFF	Logical false
1	Logical true
0	Logical false

String parameter

A string parameter allows the ASCII string to be sent as a parameter. Single and double quotes are used as separators.

Examples of string parameter:

"This is Valid" "This is also Valid" "SO IS THIS"

Real response data

A large portion of measurement data are real. They are formatted as basic decimal notation or scientific notation. Most advanced programming languages all support these two formats.

Examples of real response data:

1.23E+0 -1.0E+2 +1.0E+2 0.5E+0 0.23 -100.0 +100.0 0.5

Integer response data

The integer response data are a decimal expression of an integer with the sign bit. When the status register is queried, the integer response data will be mostly returned.

Examples of integer response data:

0	Sign digit optional
+100	Leading + allowed
-100	Leading - allowed
256	No decimal point



Discrete response data

The discrete response data and discrete parameters are basically the same. The main difference is that the discrete response data can only be returned in the short format with capitalized characters.

Examples of discrete response data:

INTernal Amplitude level control mode is internal

EXTernal Amplitude level control mode is external

MMHead Amplitude level control mode is millimeter wave source module

Numeric Boolean response data

The Boolean response data returns a binary value of 1 or 0.

String response data

The string response data and string parameters are the same. The main difference is that the string response data use double quotes rather than single quotes as the separator. The string response data can also be inserted with double quotes inside which there can be no characters.

Examples of string response data:

"This is a string"

"one double quote inside brackets: (")"

6) Systems of Values in Commands

The value of the command can be entered in binary, decimal, hexadecimal or octal format. In the binary, hexadecimal, or octal format, a suitable identifier should be added in front of the value. In the decimal (default) format, an identifier isn't required. When the value without an indicator is entered, the equipment will ensure that it is entered in decimal format. The identifiers required in all formats are listed as follows:

- > #B indicates that this digit is a binary value.
- > #H indicates that this digit is a hexadecimal value.
- > #Q indicates an octal number.

The representations of the decimal value 45 in the SCPI are given as follows:

#B101101

#H2D

#Q55

The following example shows setting of the RF output power as 10 dBm (or the value equivalent to the current selected unit including DBUV or DBUVEMF) with the hexadecimal value 000A.

:POW #H000A

In a non-decimal format, the measurement unit such as DBM or mV isn't used together with the value.

7) Command line structure

A command line may contain multiple SCPIs. To indicate the end of the current command line, the following methods can be used:

- Enter;
- Enter and EOI;
- EOI and the last data byte.



Commands in command line are separated by semicolons, and commands for different subsystems begin with a colon. For example:

MMEM:COPY "Test1", "MeasurementXY";:HCOP:ITEM ALL

The command line contains two commands of which the first one belongs to the MMEM subsystem and the second one belongs to the HCOP subsystem. If the adjacent commands belong to the same subsystem, the command path will be partially repeated and the command can be abbreviated. For example:

HCOP:ITEM ALL;:HCOP:IMM

The command line contains two commands both of which belong to the HCOP subsystem of first level. Therefore, the second command can begin with the subordinate to HCOP and may not begin with a colon, which can be abbreviated to the following command line:

HCOP:ITEM ALL;:HCOP:IMM

5.1.4 Command Sequence and Synchronization

IEEE488.2 defines the difference between overlapped commands and sequential commands:

> Sequential commands are sequences of commands that are executed continuously. Usually, each command is executed fast.

> Overlapped commands indicate that the previous command is not executed automatically before the next command is executed. Normally overlapped commands take longer to process and allows the program to process other events synchronously.

Even if multiple commands are set in a command line, they are not necessarily executed in the order in which they are received. In order to ensure that the commands are executed in a certain order, each command must be sent as a separate command line.

Example: Command line contains set and query commands

If multiple commands in a command line contain query commands, the query result is unpredictable. The following command returns a fixed value:

Return value: 100000000 (1GHz)

The following command returns an unfixed value:

:FREQ:STAR 1GHz;STAR?;SPAN 1000000

The returned value may be the current start frequency value of the instrument before the command is sent, because the host program executes the commands one by one only after receiving the command message. If the host program executes the command after receiving it, the returned value may also be 1 GHz.

NOTE

Set command and query command are sent separately

General rules: in order to ensure the correct return of query command, set commands and query commands shall be sent in different remote control messages.

5.1.4.1 Preventing overlappped execution of the command

In order to prevent the overlapped execution of commands, multiple threads or commands: *OPC, *OPC? or *WAI can be used. These three commands can be executed only after the hardware is set. During programming, the computer can be forced to wait for some time to synchronize certain events. The details are separately described below:



> Controller program uses multiple threads

Multi threads are used to wait for completion of the command and achieve synchronization of GUI and program control, that is, a single thread waits for completion of *OPC?, without impeding the execution of the GUI or remote control thread.

> The usage of the three commands in synchronous execution is shown in the table below:

Method	Actions to be Executed	Programming Method
*OPC	Set the operation completion bit is set.	Set ESE BIT0; Set SRE BIT5; Send the overlapped command and *OPC; Wait for service request (SRQ) SRQ represents the completion of execution of the overlapped command
*OPC?	Stop executing the current command 1. The command is returned only when the operation completion bit in the ESR is set, which indicates that the previous command is processed.	Terminate the processing of the current command before executing other commands. Send this command directly after the current command.
*WAI	Before executing *WAI, wait until all commands are sent and continue processing the uncompleted commands.	Terminate the processing of the current command before executing other commands. Send this command directly after the current command.


5.1.5 Status reporting system

Status reporting system stores all current operating status information and error information of the instrument. Such information is stored in the status register and error queue respectively and can be queried through the remote interface.

5.1.5.1 Structure of the status register

Please refer to the hierarchical structure of status register below:





As shown in the following figure, the status information is of hierarchical structure.

Fig.5.3 Hierarchy Diagram of Status Registers

The register classification is described as follows:

1) STB, SRE

Status Byte (STB) register and its associated mask register, Service Request Enable (SRE) register, constitute the top-level register of the status reporting system. The STB saves the general working status of the instrument by collecting low-level register information.

2) ESR, SCPI status register

STB receives the information of the following registers:

- > The value of Event Status Register (ESR) and Event Status Enable (ESE) mask register.
- > SCPI status registers include: STATus:OPERation and STATus:QUEStionable registers

(SCPI definition), they contain the specific operating information of the instrument. All SCPI status registers have the same internal structure (please refer to Section 2.1.5.2 "Structure of SCPI status register" in the Programming Manual).



3) IST, PPE

Similar to the SRQ, an individual bit of the IST mark ("Individual STatus") is a combination of all statuses of the instrument. The associated parallel query enable register (PPE) determines which data bits of the STB act on the IST mark.

4) Output buffer

The output buffer stores the message returned by the instrument to the controller. It doesn't belong to the status reporting system but determines the value of the MAV bit of STB.

NOTE

SRE, ESE

The SRE can be used as an enable part of the STB. Similarly, the ESE can be used as an enable part of the ESR.

5.1.5.2 Application of status reporting system

The status reporting system is used to monitor the status of one or more instruments in the test system. To correctly realize the function of the status reporting system, the controller in the test system must receive and evaluate the information of all instruments. The standard methods applied include:

1) Query the service request (SRQ) initiated by the instrument;

2) Perform serial poll of all instruments in the bus system, which is initiated by the controller in the system in order to find out the initiator and reason of the service request.

- 3) Perform parallel query of all instruments;
- 4) Query of the status of specific instrument by remote control command;

For the details, please refer to '2.1.5.4 Application of Status Reporting System" in Programming Manual.

5.1.6 Programming considerations

1) Please initialize the instrument status before changing the settings

When setting the instrument through remote control, it is necessary to initialize the instrument status (e.g. send "RST") and then set the desired status.

2) Command sequence

In general, the set and query commands should be sent separately; otherwise the returned value of the query command will change according to the current instrument operation sequence.

3) Failure response

The service request can only be initiated by the instrument itself. The controller program in the test system should instruct the instrument to initiate a service request when an error occurs, and then enter the corresponding interrupt service routine for processing.

4) Error queue

Each time the controller program processes a service request, the error queue rather than the status register of the instrument should be queried to obtain a more accurate error reason. The error queue should be frequently queried to obtain the wrong command sent by the controller to the instrument especially during testing of the controller program.

5.2 Remote interface and its configuration



CAUTION

Use of USB main control port connector on front panel

Type-A connector on the front panel is the connector of USB master control port. In S1465 series signal generator, this port is used to connect the flash disk of USB interface to upgrade the instrument TSR software. The signal generator can also be controlled by connecting USB keyboard and mouse.

5.2.1.1 Connection




Fig.5.4 LAN Interface Connection

S1465 signal generator and external controller (computer) are connected to LAN using network cable, as shown in Fig.5.4:

5.2.1.2 Interface configuration

When the signal generator is remotely controlled via LAN, the physical network connection shall be guaranteed to be smooth. As the signal generator does not support DHCP, domain name access and wide-area network connection, the network programmable setting is relatively simple. In system menu, "IP address", 'subnet mask" and 'default gateway" are set to the subnet where the master controller is located.

CAUTION

Ensure that the signal generator is physically connected properly by 10Base-T LAN or 100Base-T LAN cable

As the signal generator only supports the construction of a single LAN control system and the setting of static IP address, rather than DHCP and the access to the host via DNS and domain name server, users do not need to modify the subnet mask. In the instrument, it is fixedly set to: 255. 255. 255. 0.

5.2.2 GPIB

5.2.2.1 Connection

S1465 signal generator and external control (computer) are connected using network cable, as shown in Fig.5.5:





Fig.5.5 GPIB Interface Connection

5.2.2.2 Interface configuration

The GPIB interface settings consist of two parts: GPIB address and programming language. GPIB address is set by the menu 'GPIB Address Setting", which contains two menu items 'Local" and 'Power Meter". 'Local" is the address setting soft key of the signal generator, usually set to 19. The local GPIB address can be set by numeric keys, arrow keys and knobs (For the value editing method of the signal generator, refer to "7) Edit Data in '2.3.1.2 Common Configuration Setting Method" in this method.)

Programming language is set by the menu 'Programming Language Setting', which contains two menu items 'SCPI' and "Analyzer". The latter is used for factory debugging. When building an automatic test system, the programming language of the signal generator shall be "SCPI".

5.3 Basic programming method of the VISA interface

The basic methods for programming of remote control of the instrument through the VISA library are illustrated hereinafter. Take the C++ language as an example.

5.3.1 VISA library

VISA is a general term of standard I/O function libraries and their related specifications. VISA library function is a set of functions that can be easily recalled. Its core function enables you to control various devices, regardless of their interface types and the usage of different I/O interface software. These library functions are used to write the driver of the instrument as well as complete the command and data transmission between the computer and the instrument, so as to realize the remote control of the instrument. By initializing addressing string ("VISA Resource String"), you can establish a connection to an instrument with a programmable port (LAN, USB, GPIB, etc.).

At first, it is necessary to install the VISA library so as to achieve remote control. The VISA library packages the underlying transfer functions of underlying VXI, GPIB, LAN and USB interfaces so that the user can recall them directly. Programming interfaces supported by the signal generator: GPIB, LAN, and RS-232. The use of these interfaces in conjunction with VISA library and programming languages allows remote control of the signal generator. Agilent I/O Library provided by Agilent for users is often used as the underlying I/O library.




Fig.5.6 Programmable Software and Hardware Layers

Fig.5.6 shows the relationship between Remote Interface, VISA library, programming language and the signal generator taking GPIB interface as an example.

5.3.2 Initialization and default status setting

When the program starts, firstly initialize VISA resource manager, and then enable and establish the communication connection between VISA library and the instrument. The specific steps are as follows:

5.3.2.1 Generation of global variable

First generate global variables to be recalled by other program modules, for example: Instrument handle variable. The following example program shall contain the following global variables:

Global ViSession analyzer;

Global ViSession defaultRM;

Const char analyzerString [VI_FIND_BUFLEN] = "GPIB0::20::INSTR";

Const analyzerTimeout = 10000;

Wherein, the constant analyzerString is instrument descriptor, "GPIB0" is controller, and "20" is the instrument connected to the controller. If supposing that the instrument is connected with LAN and IP address is "192.168.1.1",, the variable will be:

5.4 I/O library

5.4.1 Overview of I/O library

As a library of software programs pre-written for the instrument, the I/O library is called an instrument driver. It is considered as the intermediate layer of the software between the computer and the instrument hardware equipment, composed of function library, utility program and tool kit, and used as a software code module set that corresponds to a planned operation, e.g. configuring, reading from, writing to or triggering the instrument. It resides in the computer as the bridge and link between the computer and the instrument, and provides an easily programmed high-level modular library so that the user no longer needs to learn complex low-level programming protocols specific to an instrument. The instrument driver is the key to rapid development and test of measurement applications.

From the aspect of function, a general instrument driver usually consists of a functional body, an interactive developer interface, a program developer interface, a subprogram interface and an I/O interface as shown in Fig. 6.7.




Fig.5.7 Instrument Driver Structure Model

The detailed description is given as follows:

1) Functional body. It is the main functional part of the instrument driver and can be understood as the framework program of the instrument driver.

2) Interactive developer interface. For user's convenience, a graphical interactive developer interface is generally provided in the application development environment that supports the development of the instrument driver. For example, the function panel in Labwindows/CVI is an interactive developer interface. In the function panel, each parameter of the instrument driver function is represented by a graphical control.

3) Program developer interface. It is a software interface for recalling of the instrument driver function by the application, such as the dynamic link library file .dll of the instrument driver of the Windows system.

4) I/O interface. It is used to complete the actual communication between the instrument driver and the instrument. The bus-specific I/O software such as GPIB can be used; the common standard I/O software across multiple buses, including: VISA I/O can also be used. VISA I/O.

5) Subroutine interface. It is a software interface for the instrument driver to access other



support libraries including database and FFT function. When the instrument driver needs to recall other software modules, operating systems, program code libraries and analysis function libraries to complete its task, the subprogram interface will be used.

5.4.2 Installation and configuration of I/O library

With the development of the test field application from the traditional instrument to the virtual instrument, the instrument driver has experienced different development processes in order to solve the instrument interchangeability and test program reusability of the automatic test system. Currently, the IVI (Interchangeable Virtual Instruments) driver is popularly applied. Based on the IVI specification, a new instrument programming interface is defined, the class driver and VPP architecture are inserted onto the VISA so that the test application is completely independent of the instrument hardware, and unique instrument simulation, range detection and status buffer functions are added, which improves the system operation efficiency and truly achieves the instrument interchange.

IVI driver is divided into two types: IVI-C and IVI-COM. IVI-COM is based on Microsoft Component Object Model (COM) and adopts COM API; IVI-C is based on ANSI C and adopts C API. Both drivers are designed according to the instrument class defined in the IVI specification, with the same application development environments including Visual Studio, Visual Basic, Agilent VEE, LabVIEW and CVI/LabWindows.

Currently, it is necessary to provide two types of drivers in order to meet the demands of different users in different development environments. The IVI driver of the signal generator uses Nimbus Driver Studio to produce IVI-COM and IVI-C drivers as well as program installation package. For specific installation and configuration, please refer to documents accompanied with the control card and I/O Library of your choice.

The IVI drivers installed are divided into: IVI intrinsic function group and instrument class function group (basic function group and extended function group). For details about functional classification, functions and attributes, please refer to the accompanied help document of the driver.

NOTE

Configuration of ports and installation of IO library

When a computer is to be used to control the signal generator, please confirm that the necessary ports and I/O library have been properly installed and configured.



6 Fault Diagnosis & Repair

This chapter aims to help you to identify a problem and receive after-sales service. Error information of the signal generator is also introduced.

If you have any doubt about operating the S1465 series signal generator, or if you need to purchase any parts or accessories related, refer to this chapter for perfect after-sales service.

A problem is usually caused by the hardware, software or improper operation. Please contact us immediately if there is any problem. In the event where your signal generator is within warranty period, free service will be provided as promised in the warranty certificate; in the event where your signal generator is out of warranty, the service will be charged as required in the agreement.

6.1 **Operating Principle**

To help the user to know the functions of S1465 series signal generator and to solve an operation problem easily, this section introduces basic operating principle of signal generator and functional block diagram of hardware.

6.1.1 Instrument operating principle & functional block diagram of hardware




Fig.6.1 Block diagram of instrument hardware overall plan

The S1465 series signal generator adopts artificial intelligence instrument hardware platform based on modern computer technology, and Windows 7 MTOS. The design concept of modulization and option is observed in design, and both the instrument hardware and software can be divided into relatively independent modules. The system mainly consists of instrument main console, frequency synthesis, vector signal generating, RF signal conditioning, baseband signal generating and conditioning modules. A detailed block diagram of instrument hardware overall plan is shown in Fig.6.1.

The instrument main console provides work environment support for all instrument functional units.



The frequency synthesizer produces high-purity continuous wave RF signal through multiloop frequency synthesis technique.

Vector signal generation unit divides and mixes the RF signal from frequency synthesizer, which then enters in RF vector modulated component for vector modulation so that a RF vector modulated signal can be obtained; after frequency multiplication, RF signal enters in microwave vector modulated component for vector modulated signal can be obtained; both the microwave vector modulated signal and MMW signal which is frequency multiplied by 40/67GHz frequency multiplied component are converted to a MMW vector modulated signal, thus generating full range vector signal.

RF signal conditioning unit filters the signal, completes the fixed amplitude, pulse modulation, programmable attenuation and other amplitude control functions, and outputs the signal to RF output port.

Baseband signal generating and conditioning drive unit has such functions as internal baseband signal generation, baseband signal input selection, baseband signal conditioning, and vector modulator drive. Baseband signal generator produces baseband modulated signals and common standard communication modulated signals, required by digital modulation. The signal through I/Q conditioning drive is input to the RF vector modulated component and microwave vector modulated component, to drive I/Q modulator.

The I/Q conditioning drive receives I/Q signal, external input I/Q signal and other calibrated signals produced by baseband signal generator, then regulates circuits through gain adjustment, offset voltage correction and differential signal conversion etc., and finally outputs to drive both low-range I/Q modulator and high-range I/Q modulator, generating the required vector modulated signal. Wide-band I/Q input signal is received directly to microwave vector modulated component.

6.2 Fault diagnosis and troubleshooting

NOTE

Fault diagnosis and guide

This section provides a simple method to determine and handle with a faulty S1465 series signal generator (if any). Please feed back the problem accurately to the factory when necessary, so that we can provide service for you as soon as possible.

Fault symptom and troubleshooting methods are listed as below based on the type of function.

6.2.1 System issue

6.2.1.1 Ready lamp fails

Check if signal generator 220V AC input is normal. Any deviation from the maximum allowable deviation of 220V±10% may stop the instrument working normally. In the case of any abnormality, check external circuits, locate the fault, troubleshoot the instrument, and then turn it on again. If the battery of instrument itself is the cause, send the instrument back to the factory for battery repair or replacement

6.2.1.2 Fan fails after power on

In the event that the fan fails after power on, check if it gets blocked or dusty. If any, turn off the instrument to remove the obstacles or clean the fan. Turn on the instrument again, and check that the fan works. Otherwise it should be repaired or replaced by the factory.

6.2.2. Unlocked hardware

6.2.2.1 Unlocked reference loop

The user interface state indicator displays the alarm information: "Unlocked reference loop". If



the signal generator is started in non-ready mode (i.e. cold start), transient unlocked reference loop may occur. The alarm information should disappear 10 minutes after power on, if this is disregarded, otherwise there must be a fault. When a fault occurs, carry out the following steps for troubleshooting:

Operation steps:

Step 1. Press the front panel key [System], to activate the system configuration dialog.

Step 2. Select [Instrument Self Test] and activate the self test dialog to start the instrument self test automatically.

Step 3. Operate the up and down arrow keys to find and check the failed self test, and then continue the following operations:

Step 4. Select [Step] switch to ON;

Step 5. Select [Step Mode Allways Error] switch to Error; Step 6. Select [Run test];

Step 7. When some self test contains multi steps, press the button [Continue] till the self test is completed.

Step 8. Record the configuration value of each step and send it back to the factory.

6.2.2.2 Unlocked local oscillator

when user interface state indicator displays "Unlocked local oscillator", carry out the following steps:

Operation steps:

Step 1. Press the front panel key [System], to activate the system configuration dialog.

Step 2. Select [Instrument Self Test] and activate the self test dialog to start the instrument self test automatically.

Step 3. Operate the up and down arrow keys to find and check the A9 local oscillator board, and then continue the following operations:

Step 4. Select [Step] switch to ON;

Step 5. Select [Step Mode Allways Error] switch to Error; Step 6. Select [Run test];

Step 7. When some self test contains multi steps, press the button [Continue] till the self test is completed.

Step 8. Record the configuration value of each step and send it back to the factory.

6.2.2.3 Unlocked YO loop

When user interface state indicator displays "Unlocked YO loop", carry out the following steps:

Operation steps:

Step 1. Press the front panel key [System], to activate the system configuration dialog.

Step 2. Select [Instrument Self Test] and activate the self test dialog to start the instrument self test automatically.

Step 3. Operate the up and down arrow keys to find and check A8 fractional-N, sweep board, and A9 local oscillator board, and then continue the following operation:

Step 4. Select [Step] switch to ON;

Step 5. Select [Step Mode Allways Error] switch to Error; Step 6. Select [Run test];

Step 7. When some self test contains multi steps, press the button [Continue] till the self test is completed.

Step 8. Record the configuration value of each step and send it back to the factory.





Processing sequence of unlocked loop

Unlocked local oscillator can cause unlocked YO loop. So when two alarm indications are shown, troubleshoot the unlocked local oscillator, and then the unlocked YO loop.

6.2.2.4 Unlocked PLL

When user interface state indicator displays "Unlocked PLL", carry out the following steps:

Operation steps:

Step 1. Press the front panel key [System], to activate the system configuration dialog.

Step 2. Select [Instrument Self Test] and activate the self test dialog to start the instrument self test automatically.

Step 3. Operate the up and down arrow keys to find and check the failed self test, and then continue the following operations:

Step 4. Select [Step] switch to ON;

Step 5. Select [Step Mode Allways Error] switch to Error; Step 6. Select [Run test];

Step 7. When some self test contains multi steps, press the button [Continue] till the self test is completed.

Step 8. Record the configuration value of each step and send it back to the factory.

6.2.3 Unfixed amplitude

CAUTION

Unfixed amplitude is indicated.

When the power level setting of the signal generator is out of the indicated range, "Unfixed amplitud" may be displayed, which is normal and reminds the user of uncertainty of signal generator output power.

Carry out the following steps, when user interface state indicator displays "Unfixed amplitude":

Operation steps:

Step 1. Press the front panel key [System], to activate the system configuration dialog.

Step 2. Select [Instrument Self Test] and activate the self test dialog to start the instrument self test automatically.

Step 3. Operate the up and down arrow keys to find and check the failed self test, and then continue the following operations:

Step 4. Select [Step] switch to ON;

Step 5. Select [Step Mode Allways Error] switch to Error; Step 6. Select [Run test];

Step 7. When some self test contains multi steps, press the button [Continue] till the self test is completed.

Step 8. Record the configuration value of each step and send it back to the factory

6.2.4 Cold timebase



CAUTION

Cold timebase indication

When the signal generator's 10M crystal oscillator is unstable, the "Cold timebase" indication may occur immediately after the instrument is turned on. Otherwise, the 10M crystal oscillator may be damaged. Contact the factory for repair.

When user interface state indicator displays "Cold timebase", carry out the following steps:

Operation steps:

Step 1. Press the front panel key [System], to activate the system configuration dialog.

Step 2. Select [Instrument Self Test] and activate the self test dialog to start the instrument self test automatically.

Step 3. Operate the up and down arrow keys to find and check the failed self test, and then continue the following operations:

Step 4. Select [Step] switch to ON;

Step 5. Select [Step Mode Allways Error] switch to Error; Step 6. Select [Run test];

Step 7. When some self test contains multi steps, press the button [Continue] till the self test is completed.

Step 8. Record the configuration value of each step and send it back to the factory.

6.2.5 RF output power issue

6.2.5.1 Low RF output power

Check if amplitude offset is shown in the amplitude display area of front panel user interface, and if any, it indicates that the amplitude offset has been set. Amplitude offset can change the value displayed in the amplitude area of the display, but not affect the output power, and the displayed power is equal to the actual output power of signal generator plus the offset.

Cancel the amplitude offset as follows:

Press the key 【Amplitude】 or click [Amplitude] area, set the [Amplitude offset] to 0dB, then the amplitude offset indication disappears, and now amplitude offset function is cancelled.

6.2.5.2 Loss of RF output signal due to use of mixer

When the signal generator is used along with spectrum analyzer with no pre-selection function, reverse power effect may cause an incorrect RF port output from the signal generator. Some spectrum analyzers at certain frequency points can cause the RF input port to produce +5dBm local oscillator feedthrough. If frequency difference between local oscillator feedthrough and RF carrier is lower than the ALC bandwidth of the signal generator, then the reverse power of the local oscillator may modulate amplitude for the RF output of signal generator. The effect of reverse power can be solved by using one of such two ALC working modes as setting ALC loop to open, and setting ALC to work in manual power search mode.

6.2.6 RF output port unmodulated

Check front panel user interface for RF output indication. If the RF output is off, press the key [RF ON/OFF] to enable RF output. Check if there is output in continuous wave state when no output is found yet. Test the analog modulation and digital modulation outputs in sequence, and contact the factory if the problem remains unsolved.



6.2.7 Sweeping issue

6.2.7.1 Stop sweeping

The current sweeping state is displayed in status bar at the bottom of the instrument. Observe the progress bar and check if the sweeping is in the process. If the sweeping has stopped, inspect:

1) If sweep is started and if it is continuous sweep mode. If it is single sweep mode, make sure that, after the previous sweep is finished, the single sweep soft key of sweep control has been clicked at least once.

2) If the signal generator receives proper sweep trigger signal, set the sweep trigger to automatic mode, and check if missing sweep trigger signal stops sweep.

3) If dwell time is proper, set the dwell time to 1s, and check if invisible dwell time is actually caused by improper setting of dwell time.

4) If there are at least two points in step sweep or list sweep.

6.2.7.2 Failure to stop sweeping

To stop sweeping when the instrument is in step sweep or list sweep state, select [Close (CW)] in the option of [Current Sweep Type] below the sweep configuration dialog.

6.2.7.3 Incorrect dwell time in the case of list sweep

Currently the dwell time is set by software interrupt timing, which causes deviations. Please contact the factory for solution.

6.2.8 Data storage issue

NOTE

Maximum number of saving/loading instrument state

For the S1465 series signal generator, up to 100 instrument states can be saved/loaded, with the register serial numbers of 0 - 99. When a serial number of more than 99 is input, the state will be saved to 99# register automatically.

6.2.8.1 Saved instrument state is null

Saving/loading instrument state file is saved under the "D:\S1465data\user" folder as default, and for user files under the user folder, backups and recovery function are not provided. If some file is missing due to power failure or improper operation, please contact our service center according to the contact information on the second page of this manual or in the section "6.4 Repair methods".

6.2.9 Unresponsive front panel keys

If the signal generator does not respond to front panel keys, check if it is set to remote control mode (in which mode, remote control indication will be shown on the display screen). To exit from this mode, press down the front panel key [Local] to switch the signal generator from the remote control to local control.

6.2.10 Remote control issue

6.2.10.1 Command channel blocked

In remote control mode, if the signal generator receives a series of SCPI remote control commands, carry out failure timeout as follows: In trigger sweep mode, failure to receive trigger signal leads to control waiting timeout, and the remote control channel (GPIB, LAN and other interfaces) between the control and the signal generator is blocked, so other commands can not be received. In this case, the current remote control configuration should be suspended to allow the control to regain the right of control of remote channel as follows:



Step 1. The control sends the command "Clear instrument", and then the signal generator clears all the current commands in working status on remote channel, to receive new remote control commands. Send command according to the interface and protocol type:

- Visa: viClear();
- ➢ GPIB: ibclr();
- ➢ RSIB: RSDLLibclr().

Step 2. During remote control configuration, send SCPI "ABORt", cancel the current configuration and reset the trigger system.

6.3 Error information

The signal generator records the error in configuration in two ways: The front panel displays both error information queue and SCPI (in remote control mode) error information queue, which are stored and managed separately.

6.3.1 Error information file

In the current version of S1465 series signal generator, error information file can not be viewed.

6.3.2 Error information description

6.3.2.1 Local error information

Error information view

Operation method through interface:

When an error message is displayed at the lower right corner of signal generator during operation, the signal generator software must be running or the hardware must be faulty. You can determine the type of the fault according to the error code and then take appropriate measures for troubleshooting.

There is only one error message shown in the error display area of the signal generator. However several issues may occur in the instrument, and the signal generator displays them in sequence.

6.3.2.2 Remote control error information

1) Format and description of error information

In remote control mode, error information is recorded in the error/event queue of status reporting system, inquire the error information through the command "SYSTem:ERRor[:NEXT]?" in the format of:

"<Error code>, "<Error information in error queue>; <Detailed description of error information>"

Example:

"-135," data is out of bound; input parameter is out of lower bound."

There are two typed of remote control error information:

➢ For negative value erroe code defined by SCPI, detailed description of error information is not provided. Refer to "Appendix C Error information zoom table".

See table below for instrument feature positive value error codes.



Table 6.1 List of instrument feature error information

Error code	Error Description
1052	Data error Only for digital-based band interface: Digital I/Q input data error.
1053	FIFO overload Only for digital-based band interface: High external input sampling rate.
1054	Input overload Signal power of RF input port is out of specified range.
1055	No reference. The signal generator does not detect any required external reference single input.
1056	OVEN OCXO is below working temperature, and a few minutes later after power on, OCXO enters normal working state, and the error information disappears.

2) Type of error information

Error event is only provided with an error information, and types of error information are as follows:

➢ Query error (-499 to -400): Instrument output queue control detects the message exchange protocol error described in IEEE 488.2, Chapter 6. Now the event state register's query error bit (bit2) is set (refer to IEEE 488.2, 6.5 for details). Now data can not be read successfully from output queue.

> Instrument feature error (399 to -300, 201 to 703, and 800 to 810): Instrument operation fails, which may be caused by abnormal hardware/firmware state, and this error code is often used in instrument self test. Now the event state register's instrument feature error bit (bit3) is set.

 \succ Execution error (-299 to -200): Fault is detected during configuration of the instrument. Now the event state register's execution error bit (bit4) is set.

➢ Command error (-199 to −100): The instrument detects syntactic error during command parsing, which is caused by incorrect command format. Now the event state register's command error bit (bit5) is set.

6.4 Repair methods

6.4.1 Contact us

When the S1465 series signal generator is faulty, first view the error information and store it, find possible causes and refer to the methods provided in the section "6.2 Fault diagnosis and troubleshooting", so as to troubleshoot the signal generator in advance. Please contact our service center according to the contact information below in the case of fault unsolved, and provide collected error information, so that we can help you to solve your problem as early as possible.

6.4.2 Packaging and transport

If you have any intricate problem with your signal generator, contact us by phone or fax. After necessary repair is confirmed, pack the signal generator with original packaging materials and put it in a box before the following steps.

1) A detailed description of fault symptom should be provided and attached to the signal generator.

2) The signal generator should be packed by the original packaging materials, so as to minimize damages.

3) Four corners of external packaging box should be cushioned before the instrument is put in the box.



- 4) The packaging box should be sealed up by adhesive tape, and then fastened by nylon tape.
- 5) Words "Fragile! Do not touch! Handle with care! " should be marked on the box.
- 6) The instrument should be consigned as a precise instrument.
- 7) The copies of all transport documents should be retained.

CAUTION

Precautions for packaging

Packaging the signal generator with other materials may damage the instrument. Packaging materials of polystyrene spheres must not be used. They can not protect the instrument fully, but produce static electricity which in turn will draw them to the instrument fan, thus damaging the instrument.

NOTE

Packaging and transport of instrument

Please observe the precautions in the section "2.1.1.1 Unpacking" strictly during the transport or handling of the instrument (for example, damage during shipment).



7 Test Methods

This chapter introduces the main test methods of the S1465 series signal generator.

7.1 Performance Characteristics Test

7.1.1 Recommended test method

7.1.1.1 Frequency characteristics

1) Frequency range

a) Test description

The frequency range, also known as frequency coverage, is the frequency range over which the signal generator can provide acceptable signals. It is usually specified by its upper and lower frequency limits. This test is to verify whether the frequency range of the signal generator is acceptable. When the output frequency of the signal generator under test is set to more than 40 GHz, the fundamental wave frequency mixer is used for down-conversion, and then the microwave frequency meter is used for testing.

b) Test block diagram




Fig.7.1 Frequency Range Test Block Diagram

d) Test procedures

Step 1. Power on and reset it, and warm it up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.1.

Step 3. Set the signal generator under test to continuous wave mode.

Step 4. Set the output frequency of the signal generator to the lower limit frequency of 100 kHz and the power of +10 dBm. Test directly with the microwave frequency meter and record the measurement results. If the test result is within 100 kHz \pm 1 Hz, the test at this frequency point is successful. Otherwise, the test fails.

Step 5. Set the output frequency of the signal generator to the upper limit frequency.



When the frequency is 40 GHz and below, the output frequency value of the signal generator under test is directly measured with a frequency meter. When the frequency is between 50 GHz and 67 GHz, the frequency mixer and the local oscillator source are connected as shown in the figure. The local oscillator source and the frequency meter shall have the same time base. The frequency of the local oscillator is set to 45 GHz and 60 GHz respectively, and the power is 10 dBm. The test results are the results measured by the frequency meter plus 45 GHz and 60 GHz. Test results should be as follows: S1465A : within 3 GHz \pm 1.5 kHz, S1465B: within 6 GHz \pm 3 kHz, S1465C: within 10 GHz \pm 5 kHz, S1465D: within 20 GHz \pm 10 kHz, S1465F: within 40 GHz \pm 20 kHz, S1465H: Within 50 GHz \pm 25 kHz, and S1465L: within 67 GHz \pm 33 kHz.

Step 6. Record the tests and process the data.

2) Frequency resolution

a) Test description

The frequency resolution is the output frequency interval that the broadband signal generator can precisely control. Change the continuous wave frequency of the broadband signal generator by 0.001 Hz and observe whether the change of the signal frequency is 0.001 Hz by using a frequency counter (frequency comparator). If yes, the frequency resolution of the broadband signal generator is 0.001 Hz.

b) Test block diagram




Fig.7.2 Frequency Resolution Test

d) Test procedures

Step 1. Power on and reset it, and warm it up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.2.

Step 3. Set the signal generator frequency to 1.000 000 001 MHz, the power to 0 dBm, and RF on.

Step 4. Set the frequency meter to work in channel 1 mode with a resolution of 0.001 Hz.

Step 5. Change the output frequency of the signal generator under test to 0.001 Hz and observe if the test value of the frequency meter changes by 0.001 Hz.

Step 6. If the test meets the requirements, record the test results in the performance test records.

- 3) Internal time base aging rate
- a) Test description



This test is used to check the daily aging rate index of the internal time base. Under the preheating time and environmental conditions meeting the requirements, measure the frequency drift of the internal time base of the instrument with the standard time base and the frequency comparator once every 12 h, continuously measure 3 numbers, and take the arithmetic mean as the test result at the time of t_i. The measurement is continuously made for more than 7 days, and the average frequency drift is the internal time base aging rate.

The internal time base aging rate index is tested by the time base manufacturer and is mainly used to indicate the long-term drift of the frequency standard. There is no specific test in this manual, but general verification method is given below.

Before the test, the internal time base should be fully preheated. After the instrument is disconnected from the AC power for 2 h, it needs to be warmed up for 30 days to reach the specified time base aging rate. If the internal time base and the frequency standard differ greatly in frequency, "10 MHz Standard Debugging" should be performed to keep the same frequency accuracy of the internal time base as that of the standard time base.

Due to the impact of the test environment on the accuracy of the internal time base, the test shall be carried out with the followings ensured:

The ambient temperature changes within ±2°C.

The instrument maintains the same direction as the earth's magnetic field.

The instrument is at the same height.

The instrument shall not be subjected to any mechanical shock.




Fig.7.3 Internal Time Base Aging Rate Test


Step 1. Power on and reset it, and warm it up for at least 30 minutes. Step 2. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.3.

Step 3. Set the signal generator under test: Continuous wave 10 GHz, power 0 dBm, and RF on.

Step 4. The reading of the frequency comparator is relative average frequency offset. Read a set of relative average frequency offset data every 12 hours, measure three numbers in each group and take the arithmetic average as the time measurement data (n=2 measurements per day). Continuously measure it for 7 days and get a total of 15 measurement data.

Step 5. Calculate the daily aging rate K by the following formula:





Where,

Yi --- the frequency value measured for the ith measurement in Hz;

YP --- the average frequency measured for N measurements in Hz;

ti --- the time for the ith measurement in h;

tp --- the time of the Nth measurement in h;

N --- the number of measurements.


Notes: Refer to 5.15.5 in GB/T 12114-2013 for test methods.

4) Harmonic parasitism

a) Test description

This test is used to verify whether the harmonic index of the signal generator is acceptable. The harmonic is an integer multiple of the output frequency of the signal generator. During this test, set the output power of the signal generator to a power level of +10 dBm or the maximum indicated output power, manually adjust the output frequency within the index frequency range, and test and find the worst point of the harmonics with the spectrum analyzer.

b) Test block diagram



c) Test equipment

d) Test procedures

Step 1. Power on and reset it, and warm it up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.4.

Step 3. Set the signal generator under test to continuous wave mode, the power level to +10 dBm or the maximum indicated power and RF on.

Step 4. Adjust the output frequency up to 33.5 GHz within the signal generator specifications, test and find the worst point of the harmonics with the spectrum analyzer. During the test, the signal generator shall be tested in segments (segment point at 3.2 GHz), and the span of the spectrum analyzer shall be appropriately adjusted according to the change of the output frequency of the signal generator. During the test, the frequency step of the signal generator before the segment point is 10 MHz, and the frequency step after the segment point is 100 MHz.

Step 5. Record the test results.



5) Non-harmonic parasitism

a) Test description

This test is used to verify whether the non-harmonic indexes are acceptable within the entire frequency range of the signal generator. Non-harmonics are undesired parasitic or residual signals generated by the frequency synthesis section and appear as fixed signal outputs or signal outputs with some frequency offset. Set the signal generator to a series of CW output frequencies that are most likely to produce non-harmonics, and then tune the spectrum analyzer to the corresponding parasitic signals to measure and find the worst point of the non-harmonics.

b) Test block diagram

The test block diagram is the same as Fig.7.4.

c) Test equipment

Spectrum analyzer

1 set

d) Test procedures

Step 1. Power on and reset it, and warm it up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.4.

Step 3. Set the signal generator under test: Continuous wave 100MHz, power 0 dBm, and RF on.

Step 4. Use the spectrum analyzer to measure the level dBc of non-harmonic parasitic deviation carrier beyond 3 kHz from the carrier and record it in the test record. If non-harmonic parasitism is not visible, no record is taken.

Step 5. Set the span of the spectrum analyzer to 500 kHz and 5 MHz respectively, and repeat the step 4.

Step 6. Set the output frequency of the signal generator to 3 GHz, 6/10 GHz, 20 GHz, 28.5 GHz (S1465F/H/L-V), 40 GHz, and 50/67 GHz respectively and repeat the steps 4 and 5.

Step 7. Record the test results in the performance test records.

7.1.1.2 Power characteristics

1) Maximum ALC output power test

a) Test description

This test is used to verify whether the ALC output power range of the signal generator is acceptable. Set the output power of the signal generator under test to 3 dB above the maximum indicated output power and use the power meter to directly test the ALC output power range.

Step 1. Power on and reset it, and warm it up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.5.

Step 3. Set the signal generator to the fixed frequency mode, the output frequency to 100 kHz (10 MHz for the H06 option), the output power to 3 dB above the maximum indicated power, and the RF on.

Step 4. When there is no "No ALC" indication on the signal generator, use the power meter to measure the power value at this time and fill it in the test record table. When the "No ALC" indication appears on the signal generator, gradually reduce the output power of the signal generator by 0.1 dB. When the "No ALC" indication just disappears, record the power meter reading at this time and fill it in the test record table.

Step 5. Set the output frequency of the signal generator to 10 MHz, 250 MHz, 3/6 GHz, 9 GHz,10 GHz, 15 GHz, 20 GHz, 30 GHz, 40 GHz, 50 GHz, and 67 GHz respectively until the highest frequency is reached, and then repeat the step 4.

Step 6. Record the tests and process the data.

- 2) Minimum ALC output power test
- a) Test description

This test is used to verify whether the minimum ALC output power range of the signal generator is acceptable.




Fig.7.6 Low Power Test

d) Test procedures

Step 1. Power on and reset it, and warm it up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.5, set the signal generator frequency to 100 kHz and the power to 0 dBm, and record the reading P1 of the power meter.

Step 3. Connect the spectrum analyzer to the signal generator as shown in Fig.7.6. Set the power of the signal generator to 0 dBm. Set this level to the reference level and use the spectrum analyzer relative measurement mode to set the signal generator power to the minimum ALC power. Use the spectrum analyzer to test relative difference P2 of its minimum ALC power relative to 0 dBm (P1 + P2 is the measured value of the minimum ALC output power) and record the measured value on the test record table.

Step 4. When the attenuator is not used, the minimum ALC range is acceptable if the measured value of the minimum ALC output power is within the power accuracy index. When the attenuator is used, the minimum ALC range is acceptable if the error of the minimum ALC output power measured for S1465A/B/C/D/F or for S1465H and S1465L is within ± 3.5 dB or ± 4 dB.

Step 5. Set the output frequency of the signal generator to 10 MHz, 1 GHz, 3/6/10 GHz, 20 GHz, 40 GHz, 50 GHz, and 67 GHz respectively and repeat the steps 1) to 3).

Step 6. Record the tests and process the data.

3) Power accuracy

a) Test description

This test is used to check whether the power accuracy index of the signal generator satisfies requirements at several frequency points with the power meter and the spectrum analyzer. Set the frequency of the signal generator to 100 kHz, 10 MHz, 500 MHz, 3/6/10 GHz, 20 GHz, 40 GHz, 50 GHz, and 67 GHz respectively, and gradually decrease the power output from the maximum indicated output power to the minimum indicated power (-20dBm when the attenuator is not used and select the appropriate index according to different attenuators when they are used), and measure whether the output power accuracy is acceptable with the power meter and the spectrum analyzer.

b) Test block diagram

The same as the Fig.7.5 and 7.6.

c) Test equipment

d) Test procedures

Step 1. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.5 and start and warm up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Set the signal generator output frequency to 100 kHz, maximum indicated output power level, and RF on.

Step 3. Connect the power meter and set the power meter frequency to 100 kHz. Then set the signal generator output power up to -10 dBm with the step of 1 dB. Record the measured value on the test record table.

Step 4. Set the signal generator power to 0 dBm and record the reading P1 of the power meter.

Step 5. Connect the spectrum analyzer to the signal generator as shown in Fig.7.6. Set the signal generator power to 0 dBm, attenuate to the minimum indicated power P2 with the step of 10 dB, and test the relative difference P3 between the power at each frequency point and 0 dBm.

The power accuracy error is: Δ =P3-P1-P2, fill in the test record table.

Step 6. Set the output frequency of the signal generator to 10 MHz, 500 MHz, 3/6/10 GHz, 20 GHz, 40 GHz, 50 GHz, and 67 GHz respectively and repeat the steps 3 and 4.

Step 7. Record the tests and process the data.

7.1.1.3 Modulation characteristics

1) Pulse modulation rise and fall time test

a) Test description

This test is used to verify whether the pulse modulation rise and fall time of the signal generator is acceptable. Detect the pulse modulation signal with the detector and use the oscilloscope to observe whether the rise and fall time of the detected pulse signal meets the requirement of the specifications.




Fig.7.7 Pulse Modulation On-off Ratio Test

e) Test procedures

Step 1. Connect the device as shown in Fig.7.5 and start and warm up for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2. Set the signal generator output frequency to 100 kHz, maximum indicated output power level, and RF on.

Step 3. Set the signal generator under test to 2 GHz continuous wave with the power level of 0 dBm.

Step 4. Set the pulse modulation form of the signal generator under test as follows:

Step 5. Set the digital storage oscilloscope to measure the pulse modulation rise and fall time as follows:

Trig Level 10 mV Trig Edge Rise

Time Base 1 µs/Div

Adjust the time base delay to allow the oscilloscope to display at least one cycle of the signal

Select the rise or fall time measurement in **[**MEASURE**]** function of the oscilloscope so that the oscilloscope automatically measures the pulse rise or fall time.

Step 6. Follow the above steps for S1465C/D/F/H/L. Test the pulse modulation rise and fall time at 10 GHz of the signal generator under test.

Step 7. Record the tests and process the data.

2) Pulse modulation on-off ratio test

a) Test description

The pulse modulation on-off ratio mainly reflects the signal leakage when the pulse modulation is off. Turn on or off the pulse modulation and measure the difference between the signal powers in the two cases as the pulse modulation on-off ratio.




Fig.7.8 Pulse Modulation Rise/Fall Test

Set the signal generator for pulse modulation as follows: Modulation Pulse Modulation Pulse Input Selection Ext Pulse Modulation ON, observe and record the on-off ratio at this time on the spectrum analyzer.

Set the signal generator to cancel the pulse modulation as follows: Modulation Pulse Modulation Pulse Modulation OFF.

Step 6. Test the pulse modulation on-off ratio of the signal generator at 1 GHz, 3 GHz, 10 GHz, 15 GHz, 20 GHz, 25 GHz, 30 GHz, 35 GHz, 40 GHz, and 67 GHz respectively and record the worst test result in the performance test record.

3) EVM and original offset test

a) Test description

This test is used to verify whether the EVM and the original offset of the vector signal generator meet the requirements of the specifications.




Fig.7.9 EVM and Original Offset Test

With the delta frequency marker function of the signal analyzer, the power difference between the maximum and minimum power points is divided by 2 to get the modulation frequency response.

5) External modulation bandwidth test

The I/Q modulation generates a double-sideband modulation signal, and the signal analyzer is used to observe the frequency response of the double-sideband signal. When testing, the vector signal generator is set to ALC open loop. The sweep time of the sweep signal generator is set to 50 s.




Fig.7.10 External FM Frequency Response Test

The source voltage standing wave ratio reflects the degree of influence of the reflected signal on the output power of the final signal generator when the signal generator mismatches during output. Refer to 5.15.14 in GB 12114-2013 for test methods.




Fig.7.11 Source Standing Wave Test

Appendix A Explanations of Terms

Frequency accuracy

The deviation between the frequency value displayed by the signal generator and the true value, which is usually expressed as a relative error:

$$\alpha = \frac{f - f0}{f0} = \frac{\Delta f}{f0} \times 100\%$$

Where f_0 is the signal generator scale value and f is the true value.

The frequency accuracy of the low-range signal generator is only 1%, while the frequency accuracy of the internal high-steady crystal oscillator can reach 10⁻⁸ to 10⁻¹⁰.

Frequency stability

The frequency stability means the magnitude of the deviation of the signal generator output frequency relative to the set reading within a specified time when the external conditions and the environment are constant.

Harmonic distortion and spectrum purity

The ideal sine wave should be a single frequency. Because the non-linear elements inside the signal generator cause the signal to generate non-linear distortion and harmonic components, the signal distortion is usually used to indicate the degree of the signal close to the ideal sine wave, and is expressed by the distortion coefficient γ :

I/Q modulation

The function of the I/Q modulator is to load I and Q signals onto the carriers. The I/Q modulator consists of a symbol builder, a carrier local oscillator, a frequency mixer, a 90° phase shifter, and a linear superimposer. The symbol builder is responsible for converting the input modulation baseband signal into odd-even two-way signals through serial-to-parallel conversion. Therefore, the modulation method in the digital transmitter is actually determined by its symbol builder. Some literatures refer to the correspondence between information and carrying signals as "mapping". The receiving end extracts the transmitted information from the received signal according to the mapping relationship previously agreed.

There are many ways to map information and signals. Different modulation techniques use different mapping methods. The main purpose of digital modulation is to control the transmission efficiency. Different digital modulation techniques are distinguished by their mapping methods and their performances are also determined by their mapping methods. This mapping relation is implemented by the symbol builder. The two frequency mixers, in-phase I and quadrature Q, are excited by the LO signals of the two local oscillators. The local oscillator signal of the lower frequency mixer is orthogonal to that of the upper frequency mixer, namely, the frequency mixers' local oscillator carriers are orthogonal to each other. Then the outputs of the two frequency mixers are mixed.

Note that the I/Q modulator uses analog technique (RF frequency mixer and RF synthesizer) and monolithic microwave integrated circuit MMIC, and even it is implemented in the DSP. The I/Q modulator changes the control problem from signal phases to two-way orthogonal component voltages. The I/Q indicates the orthogonal transformation of the modulated signal. The Q component signal is phase-shifted by 90 degrees with respect to the carrier. If only the I channel is used for detection, the I output is 0 V although the Q input signal exists because of $Cos(90^\circ) = 0$ and there is no output signal in the I channel. Therefore, a vector-modulated signal can be generated by linearly superimposing the signal in-phase and quadrature components, without worrying that the I and Q components interfere with each other. For wireless transmission, it shall be sent out after being added (Σ) and synthesized.

Speech coding

Speech coding is the most important source coding in wireless communication systems because speech transmission is the basic service of such systems. The purpose of speech coding should be to use as few channel bandwidths as possible to deliver the highest possible speech quality while maintaining certain algorithm complexity and communication delay.



Speech coding can be classified into three categories:

1) Waveform coding (such as pulse code modulation PCM), whose transmitted source data is the sampling quantized value of the speech signal waveform. Waveform coding truly reflects the waveform changes of the speech signals and retains all intrinsic features of the speech, so its intelligibility and naturalness are good. However, the code rate of the waveform coding is high and the band utilization is poor since the speech waveform contains a large number of redundant components.

2) Parameter coding (such as linear predictive coding LPC), whose transmitted source data is not a speech waveform, but characteristic parameters of speech extracted by a linear prediction algorithm. Parameter coding equates the human sound system to an excitation and linear filtering model and represents the change in speech through model parameters updated constantly. Parameter coding can greatly reduce the transmission code rate and extremely improve the utilization rate of the frequency bands. However, simple parameter coding is limited by the feature extraction algorithm and can achieve certain intelligibility, but the naturalness of speech is poor.

3) Hybrid coding, namely an algorithm that synthesizes waveform coding and parameter coding. This not only reduces the code rate, but also improves the naturalness of synthesized speech. It is a source coding method commonly used in wireless communications. For example, the RPE-LTP algorithm used in the GSM system and the CELP algorithm used in CDMA. The most commonly used speech coding forms include: Pulse Code Modulation (PCM), Differential Pulse Code Modulation (DPCM), Adaptive Differential Pulse Code Modulation (ADPCM), Delta Modulation (DM), Continuous Variable Slope Delta Modulation (CVSDM), Adaptive Predictive Coding (APC), Sub Band Coding (SBC), and Code-excited Linear Predictive Coding.

Channel coding

During the transmission of the digital signals in the actual channel, the transmission error is caused by the noise existing in the channel and the inter-symbol interference due to the unsatisfactory transmission characteristics of such channel. In order to improve the reliability of the digital transmission system and reduce the error rate of information transmission, measures can be taken to improve the anti-noise performance of the digital transmission system, for example, using equalization techniques to eliminate inter-symbol interference, selecting a good modulation system and demodulation method, and enhancing the directionality of the antenna.

Channel coding is classified into error detecting codes and error correcting codes. Error detecting codes can only detect errors, such as parity check codes commonly used in computer serial communications. To further improve the reliability of digital transmission systems, it is necessary to use error control coding to control possible or already existing errors.

Digital modulation

In analog modulation, the changes of carrier parameters are based on continuous analog information. In digital modulation, the changes in these carrier parameters (amplitude, frequency, and phase) are determined by discrete digital signals.

In this sense, there is no essential difference between digital and analog modulation. Digital modulation signals only have to represent discrete modulation states, which are called symbol points on the vector diagrams. The combination of such symbol points is called constellation.

1) Bit: It is a unit for transmitting information in a communication system and generally refers to useful information transmitted in a communication system. Bit rate: It is the bit transmission rate, that is, the information transmission rate in the communication system time, and the unit is bit/s.

2) Symbol: It is the discrete state of the information-modulated carrier, that is, the vector, a concept that is closely related to the carrier and modulation method. There are also symbols in analog modulation and the number of symbols is infinite, so they cannot be directly analyzed and observed. Therefore, symbols are only discussed in digital modulation and the number of its symbols is limited. A symbol is not information, but information is transmitted by mapping to a carrier state (namely a symbol) through digital modulation.

3) Symbol Rate: It is the conversion rate of the carrier modulation symbol and is actually the rate of change of the carrier state. The higher the symbol rate, the higher the corresponding information transmission rate. The higher the spectral components contained in the signals, the wider the frequency band occupied. The unit is Baud.



4) Constellation: It is the combination of all symbol points of the modulation signal on the I/Q plane. The constellation defines the mapping relation between the signal distribution of the modulation technique and the modulated digital bits. The characteristics of a modulation technique can be fully defined by signal distribution and mapping, that is, they can be fully defined by the constellation.

5) Vector Diagram: It is the process description of changes of the modulation signals among symbol points. The vector diagram shows not only the constellation points, but also the conversion process between such constellation points.

6) Eye Diagram: It is an intuitive way to check the transmission distortion of digital signals. It is a baseband signal that the low-pass filter output is not regenerated after being demodulated, and it is a waveform repeatedly swept and displayed on the oscilloscope with bit timing as the external synchronization.


The symbol rate is the rate of change of the carrier modulation state, which determines the speed of change of the modulation symbols and also determines the frequency bandwidth of the modulation signals. It is sometimes called the baud rate. The correspondence between symbol rate and bit rate is determined by the form of digital modulation. The form of digital modulation determines the number of carriers in discrete states and also determines the number of binary bits that each symbol can represent. The symbol rate is equal to the bit rate divided by the number of bits represented by per symbol:

Symbol Rate = Bit Rate / the number of bits represented by per symbol.

It can be seen that the form of digital modulation determines the efficiency of the modulation, namely the amount of information (bits) transmitted under a unit bandwidth (symbol rate). If the modulation is more complex, the modulation symbols are more and the modulation efficiency is higher.

Binary frequency shift keying 2FSK

Digital frequency modulation is also called frequency shift keying (FSK) and binary frequency shift keying is written as 2FSK. Digital frequency shift keying is used to transfer binary symbols by changing the frequency of the carrier, that is, the frequency of the carrier is controlled by the transmitted digital messages. The 2FSK signal is the modulated waveform that the symbol "1" corresponds to the carrier frequency f1 and the symbol "0" corresponds to another carrier frequency f2, which is different from f1. At this time, its spectrum can be regarded as the on-off keying of the code column on the low frequency carrier and the on-off keying of the inverse code of the code column on the high frequency carrier.


Binary phase shift keying BPSK

Binary phase shift keying (BPSK) uses phases 0 and π to represent "0" or "1" respectively. At this time, the phase jump occurs at the edge of the bit cycle. However, the phase information is retained in the middle of the interval. The receiving end demodulation is usually done near its center point. In general, the performance of the PSK system is better than that of the on-off keying FSK system.

The BPSK modulation signals can be generated by using the conventional analog modulation method (using the NRZ signal double-sideband DSB amplitude modulation) or by using the keying method. In modern communication devices, they are generally generated by using I/Q modulators.




Attached Figure 2 BPSK Diagram

Quadrature phase shift keying QPSK

The most common digital modulation is quadrature phase shift keying (QPSK). Quadrature phase shift modulation uses four different phase differences of the carriers to characterize the input digital information. The four carrier phases are 45°, 135°, 225° and 275° respectively.

The data input by the modulator is a binary digital sequence. To match the quaternary carrier phases, the binary data needs to be converted into quaternary data, that is to say, every two bits in the binary digital sequence need to be grouped together and there are four combinations 00, 01, 10 and 11, each of which is called a double-bit symbol. Each double-bit symbol consists of two binary information bits, which represent one of the four quaternary symbols respectively.

Each modulation in QPSK can transmit 2 information bits, which are transmitted through the four phases of the carrier. The demodulator determines the information bits transmitted by the transmitting end according to the constellation and the phases of the received carrier signals.




Attached Fig.2 QPSK Diagram

What are commonly used in wireless communications is BPSK and QPSK and can also be extended to 8PSK or even 16PSK. However, 16PSK is rarely used since the utilization of its I/Q plane is very low and the phase difference at the symbol points is small. From the conversion process of the 8PSK vector diagram, it can be seen that a 180-degree symbol phase change causes the signal trace to cross the original point during the modulation and its high peak-to-average ratio is not conducive to transmission. Moreover, 8PSK is an absolute phase modulation and there is a phase ambiguity problem, so it is less directly applied.






Attached Fig.3 8PSK Diagram


Quadrature amplitude modulation QAM

QAM performs suppressed carrier double-sideband amplitude modulation for two quadrature carriers with the same frequency by using two independent baseband signals and realizes transmission of two parallel digital information by using the orthogonality of the frequency spectrum of such modulated signals in the same bandwidth. The modulation methods include 4QAM (namely QPSK), I6QAM, 32QAM and 64QAM... and the constellations have 4, 16, 32 and 64... vector endpoints.

For 4QAM, its generation, demodulation, performance, and phase vector are the same as QPSK when the amplitudes of the two signals are equal. Obviously, when the symbol point is greater than or equal to 16, the distance between QAM symbol points is greater than that of PSK if the number of symbols is the same. Since the bandwidth utilization of the QAM system is higher than that of the QPSK, it is a very promising modulation method in a frequency band-limited system and has already been used in communication systems, but its performance is not as good as that of the QPSK system. Now, 128QAM and 256QAM are used in digital television systems. The 16QAM and 32QAM constellations are shown in the figures below (Attached Figures 5 and 6).



Attached Figure 5 16QAM Constellation




Attached Figure 6 32QAM Constellation

Differential modulation method $\pi/4DQPSK$

The QPSK signal discussed earlier has a high frequency band utilization. However, a 180° carrier phase jump occurs when the code group jumps from 00 to 11 or from 01 to 10. This phase jump will cross the original point, causing large envelope fluctuations. When passing through non-linear components, the distortion of the time-domain waveform will cause distortion in the frequency domain so that the out-of-band components that have been filtered out will be recovered again, and the extended spectrum will cause interference with adjacent channels. In order to eliminate such 180° phase jump, a modulation method called $\pi/4$ -DQPSK is obtained after the correction is made on the basis of QPSK. $\pi/4$ -DQPSK is a differential modulation and it is a synthesized constellation in the Attached Figure 7. Differential modulation uses relative changes of phases, not absolute phase symbols, to represent "0" or "1" bit data. The even symbol point here is on the I/Q axis and the odd symbol point (with *) is at the position 45° away from the I/Q axis. It can be seen that the maximum phase jump is limited to 135 degrees. There are four phase changes in $\pi/4$ -DQPSK, including 45°, 135°, -45° and -135° respectively. There is always a phase change for each symbol due to the use of two QPSK constellations with 45° offsets. This avoids a 180° phase change and the trace of its vector diagram does not pass zero point.




Attached Figure 7 Synthesized Constellation

QPSK modulation method

QPSK modulation I and Q bit streams are transformed at the same time, namely the two symbol clocks are provided synchronously. OQPSK modulation is another solution to solve the problem of the vector crossing zero point and has been adopted in narrowband CDMA systems. OQPSK is called Offset-QPSK and is the improved QPSK. It is also called offset quadrature phase shift keying. It has the same phase relation as QPSK. It also divides the input code stream into two channels and then performs quadrature modulation. The difference is that it shifts the code streams of the in-phase and quadrature branches by a half symbol period Tb/2 in time. Due to the offset of half symbol period of the two branches, only the polarity of one branch may be inverted at a time and the polarity invert of the symbols in the two branches will not occur at the same time. In addition, other implementation methods have the same effect as QPSK.

Constant envelope digital modulation MSK (minimum shift keying)

FSK modulation does not have as great envelope change as QAM and PSK, but FSK has an abrupt phase change when the sign changes, which can also cause amplitude abruption and spectrum regeneration. The minimum shift keying (MSK) is a constant envelope digital modulation technique developed on the basis of FSK. The minimum shift keying (MSK) is a continuous phase FSK modulation CPFSK. The continuous phase ensures that the signals have small modulation bandwidths. The frequency offset Δf of the MSK modulation and its frequency difference $2\Delta f$ satisfy the following equation:

$$2\Delta f = \frac{1}{2Tb}$$

It can be seen from the equation that the frequency offset Δf is equal to one quarter of the symbol rate I/Tb, namely the frequency difference $2\Delta f$ is equal to half the symbol rate. This special selection is called minimum shift keying (MSK).









3π/8 rotation 8PSK modulation (EDGE)

 $3\pi/8$ rotation 8PSK is a digital modulation method used in EDGE systems. The EDGE system is a technology for upgrading GSM developed in Europe and is mainly used to improve the air interface transmission rate of the GSM system. Since the original GSM system limited the modulation symbol rate and frequency bandwidth, the EDGE system uses 8PSK to achieve modulation with a higher efficiency, reaching 3 times transmission data rate with the same modulation symbol rate and frequency bandwidth. We already know that 8PSK has such disadvantages as large signal envelope fluctuations, high linearity requirements on systems, and poor anti-interference performance. Therefore, it is necessary to use the method similar to $\pi/4$ -DQPSK to solve this problem.

 $3\pi/8$ rotation 8PSK is based on the original 8PSK constellation. Each time the symbol changes, the constellation rotates $3\pi/8$ and then the symbol points transfer to new constellation points. This corresponds to 8 symbol phase changes, including $\pi/8$, $3\pi/8$, $5\pi/8$, $7\pi/8$, $-\pi/8$, $-3\pi/8$, $-5\pi/8$ and $-7\pi/8$ respectively, for realizing differential modulation 8PSK. There is always a phase change for each symbol due to the use of $3\pi/8$ offset. This avoids a 180° phase change and the trace of its vector diagram does not pass zero point.

Nyquist filter

The main factor constraining transmission baseband signals is the frequency characteristics of the system. If the transmission band is intentionally broadened to reduce this interference to any degree, it will result in unnecessary waste of the bandwidth. If the frequency band is broadened excessively, excessive noise will be introduced into the system. Therefore, it is necessary to design the signal waveform appropriately or to use an ideal transmission filter to reduce or eliminate such interference under the condition of minimum transmission bandwidth.

The Nyquist first criterion solves this problem and points out the fundamental relationship between the channel bandwidth fN and the symbol rate RS. Namely: The low-pass cut-off bandwidth fN = RS in an ideal communication channel. That is to say, this Nyquist filter can limit the signal bandwidth and eliminate interference among the symbols. It can be seen from the above figure that this raised cosine filter complying with the Nyquist criterion has zero symbol energy at the time of the adjacent bit t in the time domain impulse response, therefore it will not cause any interference among




symbols.

Filters with rectangular frequency responses are not possible in reality and filters with infinitely steep responses require infinite number of poles. However, we can use the raised cosine filter (RCF) to complete the zero-crossing Nyquist criterion. When these filters are used, the roll-off between the passband and the stopband is a cosinc function. For such filters, "half" are placed in the transmitters and the other "half" are put in the receivers. In this way, the entire raised cosine response can be obtained from the Root RCF used simultaneously by the transmitter and the receiver. In addition to noise filtering, the receiver can also use RCF to make decisions at the maximum signal-to-noise ratio, which is the characteristic of matched filter pairs.

Nyquist filter coefficient α

Channels with ideal low-pass characteristics are difficult to be implemented and channels with roll-off characteristics are practically used. The increase of its channel bandwidth over Nyquist bandwidth is: Roll-off factor α . It can be expressed as $\alpha = (BW - f N)/f N$, where BW is the channel bandwidth and f N is the Nyquist bandwidth. α is a value between 0 and 1. 1+ α indicates the extra bandwidth required for the filter to send signals without ISI. α is also called "excessive bandwidth factor", which means that the required occupied bandwidth exceeds the ideal occupied bandwidth at the same symbol rate. The bandwidth occupied by RCF-filtered signals is approximately $(1+\alpha)Rs$, where Rs is the symbol rate. As shown in the Attached Figure 10, the occupied bandwidth BW is Rs (because Fs = 0.5Rs, BW = 2Fs) when α =0; the occupied bandwidth is 2Rs when α =1. The typical value of α is usually between 0.35 and 0.5. The above figure shows the frequency characteristics of the RCF with different roll-off factors α . If the roll-off factor α is smaller, the filter characteristics are steeper, but the sidelobe level generated by the pulse is higher, causing the higher requirements for the sampling timing tolerance. These filters are generally implemented with finite impulse response (FIR) filters in some DSPs. The raised cosine roll-off filters have been widely used due to their abilities to transmit signals with great power and fast convergence to reduce inter-symbol interference. It can be seen that the Nyquist filter requires the occupied bandwidth greater than the symbol rate Rs and that its band utilization is no longer optimal. A Gaussian filter, not a Nyquist filter, is used in the GSM system. The corresponding "excessive bandwidth factor" is BT (bandwidth time factor), whose value is usually between 0.3 and 0.5. The modulation symbol rate of GSM is 270.833 KHz and the channel bandwidth is 200 KHz, so the channel bandwidth is smaller than the modulation symbol rate.
